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Buffalo Bishop Names Two Vicar Generals

Buffalo — (NC) — Auxiliary Bishop Leo R. Smith and Msgr. Joseph A. Gajpinski, pastor of St. John Kanty's Church have been named Vicar Generals of the diocese in appointments just announced by Bishop Joseph A. Burke of Buffalo.

Msgr. Albert Rung, pastor of St. Joseph's Church, was named Official of the Diocesan Tribunal. Msgr. Bernard J. McLaughlin was named Chancellor. At the same time, it was announced by Bishop Burke that His Holiness Pope Pius XII had honored 24 priests of the diocese. Seven priests were raised to the rank of Domestic Prelate with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor, and 17 were made Papal Chamberlains with the title of Very Reverend Monsignor.

Those named Domestic Prelates included Msgr. Joseph E. Schelder, Director of the Youth Department, National Catholic Welfare Conference, Washington, D. C., Monsignor McLaughlin, Chancellor, and Msgr. Sylvester J. Holbel, diocesan superintendent of schools.

All Star Giel Receives Rosary Instead Of Trophy

Winona, Minn. — (NC) — Paul Giel, named the "outstanding back of the year" by the Associated Press, was presented with a sterling silver rosary at a banquet here honoring the athlete.

Mr. H. J. Berg of the Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce made the presentation. He and Giel's coach, Wes Fessler, said they knew Paul would be more pleased with the rosary than a trophy. They asked Bishop Edward A. Fitzgerald of Winona to bless the rosary before the presentation.

The University of Minnesota player has been named for the second time "The Big Ten's Most Valuable Player" by the Big Ten Association. This is the first time in history that the association has made the award to the same player twice. Giel also was named to the All-Catholic eleven.

A native of Winona, Giel is a member of the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart parish.

In a letter to pastors of the diocese, Bishop Kearney directs that public Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament be conducted in all churches on Dec. 27 from the last Mass until evening devotions.

"Urge your people to come and pray for our co-religionists whose cribs have been demolished and whose churches have been closed," the Bishop advises.

The special day of prayer is in accordance with a decision reached by the American Bishops at their recent annual meeting in Washington. A joint statement adopted by the Bishops at the meeting expressed the deep grief of the American Bishops over the persecution in history against those who believe in God and His Christ. The Bishops promised the sufferers to "bind in prayer the wounds you suffer for justice's sake."

Reminding American Catholics that "Peter is again in chains," the Bishops pleaded:

"Let there then be supplication to God and penance that His grace be poured out in superabundant measure to strengthen those who hold the place of honor and of danger in the new warfare launched against the Church."

DECEMBER 27 will mark the third annual observance of a day of prayer for the Church in chains. Both last year and the year before American Catholics gathered in churches and in their homes on the last Sunday of the year to supplicate God for their brethren in bonds.

Stories from many parts of the country told how Catholics braved bitter cold, blizzards and snowdrifts to make those Sundays a nation-wide demonstration of love and concern for the persecuted Catholics in Communist lands.

Following is Bishop Kearney's letter ordering a day of prayer for persecuted Catholics throughout the world:

Dear Father:
Sunday, December 27, is a national day of prayer for the Church's suffering in so many places in Europe and the Orient.

Please announce public Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament from the closing of the last Mass until evening devotions, and urge your people to come and pray for our co-religionists whose cribs have been demolished and whose churches have been closed.

10,057 Converts Reported In Korea

Seoul, Korea — (NC) — More Koreans became Catholics last year than in any previous year on record.

The total of 10,057 conversions reported by the six mission territories in South Korea for the year ending June 30, 1958, is higher than any year's total previously recorded, even for all Korea.

Korean catechumens—persons taking instruction as prospective converts—numbered 14,502 in South Korea last June 30. That is also believed to surpass any previous year's figure, even for all Korea.

(South Korea takes in about two-thirds of the country. In the Communist-ruled north all priests, Korean and foreign, are captive or dead, and religious teaching is banned.)

LAST YEAR'S figures from South Korea are compared below with those of the same area for 1949. No statistics for all of South Korea could be compiled between 1949 and 1953, because of the war.

In 1939 the figures for all Korea, then undivided, were 6,067 adult converts and 12,670 catechumens.

Taegu Vicariate, which now has the largest population, reported the most converts, 4,114 last year. Korean priests, under Korean Bishop John Choi, staff the vicariate. Bishop Paul M. Ro and his priests in Seoul Vicariate, hard hit by the war, had 1,529 conversions. Taejon Prefecture, staffed by Paris missionaries and Korean priests, under Bishop Adrien Larribau, reported 2,400 converts.

Chuncheon Prefecture, under Father Hubert Hayward of Christchurch, New Zealand, had also their best year on record, with 436 converts. Part of Chuncheon is still a depopulated, front-line area.

In the Chonju Prefecture Msgr. Bartholomew Klein reported 286 converts for the year.

How many Catholics in Korea? According to latest reports, there are 167,977 Catholics in a total population of 21,354,000 in South Korea. Present conditions make an accurate census almost impossible, however. In 1947, Catholics were estimated at 157,660 in a South Korean population of 19,369,000.

The death rate during the past three and a half years of war and refugee exodus in Korea has been abnormally high. Because of the war and separation of families, the natural increase by births to Christian parents has been abnormally low.

No statistics for North Korea have been available for years. Many northern Catholics have fled south. Catholics remaining in the north are hardly number more than 50,000. Thus the total number of Korean Catholics would be between 200,000 and 220,000.

How many priests in Korea? There are now, Dec. 1953, only about 250 priests (excluding chaplains with foreign forces) for the 21-million population of South Korea. About 200 of these priests are Korean, some 40 of whom are chaplains with United States forces. Foreign missionary priests in-

South Korea number a meager 54. They are 28 Columbans, 15 Paris missionaries, 9 Maryknollers, 2 Benedictines. Twenty of these arrived this year, 13 being new, and returning after long sojourn. This year's additions were 10 Columbans, 5 Maryknollers, 3 Paris missionaries, 2 Benedictines. Seven foreign priests are on home leave from Korea, to return next year.
