

Holy Name Men Hear Bishop Urge Christian Principles In Public, Private Life

A call for the recognition of Christian principles in public and private life was sounded by His Excellency Bishop Kearney in the sermon at the Solemn Pontifical Mass marking the Feast of the Holy Name in St. Joseph's Church, last Sunday.

Sponsored by the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union, the Mass attracted 800 men from the city and area parishes.

IN HIS SERMON the Bishop warned that neglect of Christian principles, as found in the Ten Commandments and explained by Christ in the Sermon on the Mount, always leads to failure.

"Today," he explained, "we see the United Nations striving to organize the world for peace, but unless this great Council of Nations recognizes the principles of Christ it shall fall as other councils before it also failed."

"Even democracy and freedom which we value so highly are endangered in a society where Christ's principles of morality are ignored. True democracy and true freedom are destroyed when God's laws are overthrown," he said.

The Bishop deplored those who "sought Christian virtue in the name of freedom."

"I have watched two generations of boys, who have served under me at Masses, go forth to fight for the freedom we enjoy," the Bishop said. "It would be tragic if that freedom were lost now in the name of democracy and freedom."

Among the freedoms Americans do not have is the one to upset the traditions of the country, he said in discussing "the necessity of interpreting freedom in the right way."

"MORE DANGEROUS than the bombs from the sky," Bishop Kearney said, "is the dynamite hidden under the hands like an ostrich, we must put our knees on the ground and ask God for advice in interpreting democracy and freedom."

Assisting Bishop Kearney, who celebrated the Mass, was the Rt. Rev. Magr. Maynard A. Connell, assistant priest; the Rev. Arthur F. Florack and the Rev. Robert A. Keleher, assistant deacons; the Rev. Nun, Founder Of Good Counsel College, Mourned

New York—Mother Mary Aloysia, founder and first president of the College of Our Lady of Good Counsel, White Plains, died there on Tuesday, Dec. 29, 1953, after a short illness at the age of 84. She was former Superior General of the Sisters of Divine Compassion.

His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester celebrated the funeral Mass.

Before entering the Order at White Plains in 1881, Mother Aloysia was Catherine Ann Kelly of Bounton, N. J.

SHE WAS one of the first members of the order, under its founder, Mother Mary Veronica. Most of her work in religion was spent in executive positions. She became novice mistress and assistant superior of the order after the death of the founder in 1904.

In 1910, Mother Aloysia was elected Superior General of the order and held this position intermittently for 40 years. She studied at Fordham University and obtained master's and doctor's degrees there.

Under her guidance, the educational work of the order was expanded and in 1923 she became founder of the college, serving as its president until 1948. The college, with a campus of 40 acres on North Broadway, White Plains, has an enrollment of 247 young women.

Many Rochester women, alumnae of the college, are mourning their first founder.
