Jesuit Addresses Baptist Seminarians
New Orleans (NC)—Father Harold L. Cooper, S.J., director of the Inquiry Panel of Loyola University of the South, addressed students of the South, addressed students of the theological class of the Baptist Theological Seminary here.

Father Cooper explained that many beliefs of Christians have their origin, not in Scripture, but in oral tradition, "Luther," he said, "relied solely upon the written word and many Protestant sects followed suit. Alexisshafen, New Guinea (NC)—Visiting mission stations deep in the interior of his New Guinea Vicariate for the first time, Bishop Adolph A. Noser, S.V.D., Vicar Apostolic of Alexisshafen, confirmed over 4,000 Kanakas.

Philosophical Errors Refuted in Book
Peekskill, N. Y. (NC)—A number of modern philosophical errors, particularly those arising from a misapplication of theories valid in the science of physics, are refuted in a new book, "Cosmology," published here by the Graymorr Press.

Written by Father Kenneth Dougherty, S.A., teacher and convert instructor, the new work has been adopted as a text in 23 Catholic colleges and universities. Its first edition has already been sold out.

Discussing the possibility of miracles, the author cites the views of a number of prominent persons who hold that miracles can't happen. These include Albert Einstein, Jean Paul Sartre, French author and existentialist philosopher, and Max Planck, German physicist. In refuting these views, Father Dougherty proves that miracles are not against nature and that they not only can, but do, happen.

Alaska Valley Film Slated at Museum
Wildlife and soil conservation and agricultural development in Alaska's Matanuska Valley will be featured in the program of two films to be shown at Rochester Museum of Arts and Sciences on Sunday afternoon, January 10, 1954, at 2:30 and 3:30 P.M.

Film topics include "A Heritage We Guard" tracing the westward movement of trappers and settlers and the wastage of forest lands and wildlife, and "Frontier Farmers of Alaska," the story of agricultural pioneering by farm families from drought stricken areas of the United States.

Hope Abandoned For Three Soldiers On Missing List
Three Catholic boys who had previously been listed as missing in action in Korea are now presumed to be dead, it was learned this week.

A Requiem Mass was celebrated in St. Peter and Paul Church, Rochester on Tuesday, for Cpl. Herman R. Caruso who after having been listed as missing in action for almost 3 1/2 years is now officially presumed dead.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Caruso of 283 Adams St., the Army Corporal was sent to Korea from Japan immediately after the start of hostilities in June 1950.

Corporal Caruso was reported missing in action July 20, 1950, with Pfc. Ernest Busico, son of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Busico of 346 Glenwood Ave. Corporal Caruso was with a medical unit of the 19th Infantry Division. He and Private Busico had been buddies since enlisting together on Jan. 3, 1948. Pvt. Busico's status was changed to "killed in action," in November, 1950.

Mr. and Mrs. Caruso received word from the Department of the Army Saturday, they said, that "in view of the lapse of time," it must presume that their son is dead. The adjutant general's office established Dec. 31, 1953, as an arbitrary "date of death."

Besides his parents, Corporal Caruso is survived by two brothers, Anthony and Michael, both of Rochester; a sister, Mrs. Ann Carabisi, also of this city and several nephews.

Born August 31, 1931, Cpl. Caruso was a student at Madison High when he enlisted at the age of 17.

Nearly 16 months after he had been declared missing, the parents of Sgt. William D. Cullane of 146 Cottage St., who had attended Aquinas Institute before going to Jefferson High School to graduate were notified by the Defense Department of the decision.

The young sergeant was reported missing as of Sept. 29, 1952, two days before he was scheduled for rotation back to the United States. He was promoted last May.

He entered the Army in June, 1951. He previously had served 30 months in the Navy and became a mail carrier after his discharge.

Besides his parents, Sgt. Cullane, leaves a brother, John D. Cullane Jr. of Rochester and three sisters, Mrs. Robert Schaefer and Mrs. Edmund Palmgreen of Rochester and Mrs. Charles Pler of Potsdam.
