

Campaign For New Jesuit Seminary Tops \$5,000,000

Contributions totaling \$5,009,328 to date have made a success of the \$5,000,000 campaign for funds to construct the new Loyola Seminary at Shrub Oak, near Peekskill, N.Y., it was announced on January 7 by the Very Rev. John J. McMahon, S.J., Provincial of the New York Province of the Society of Jesus, which is building the seminary.

Father McMahon made the announcement before a special meeting of the Executive Committee of the Jesuit Seminary Building Fund at the Manhattan Club, New York City.

Loyola Seminary, which will train for the Jesuit priesthood students from New York State and northern New Jersey, is planned as the largest Jesuit major seminary in the world, with a capacity of 300 students and faculty members.

CONSTRUCTION BY the New York contracting firm of George A. Fuller and Company is currently under way and it is anticipated that the building will be ready for occupancy by the summer of 1955. Voorhees, Walker, Foley and Smith, of New York City, are the architects.

The Rev. John G. Furniss, S.J., Executive Chairman of the Building Fund, supplemented Father McMahon's announcement by pointing out that the amount subscribed, 100.2% of the goal set, represents donations of pledges from 25,893 individual benefactors within a two-year period. The appeal for funds began in January, 1952.
