**Doctors Give Thanks For Safe Deliveries**  
St. Louis (NC)—Fifty Catholic hospitals throughout the U.S., following the lead of St. John's Hospital here, will offer Masses of Thanksgiving attended by the hospitals' obstetricians for their record of safe deliveries.  
At St. John's Hospital 40 obstetricians of all faiths will attend the annual Mass of Thanksgiving on January 10. St. John's started the annual Mass in 1944. Not since January, 1949, has a mother died in the obstetrical department at St. John's Hospital, which is conducted by the Sisters of Mercy.

**The Green Scapular**  
The Green Scapular or Scapular of the Immaculate Heart of Mary is, like the Miraculous Medal, a gift of our Blessed Mother to the Daughters of Charity of Saint Vincent de Paul, the same community that staffs St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester.  
On Nov. 27, 1839, Justine Biqueyburu, destined by Providence to make known this devotion, entered the Seminary or Novitiate of the Daughters of Charity, 140 rue du Bac, Paris.  
On Jan. 28, 1840, during her first retreat, the young Sister was favored with a celestial vision: Our Lady appeared to her clothed in a long white robe, over which hung a bright blue mantle.  
Her hair, which fell loosely over her shoulders, was not covered with a veil, and in her hands she held her Heart, from the top of which issued brilliant rays.  
To the dignity of her bearing was joined the dazzling brightness of celestial beauty. The young Sister, seized with admiration and fear, could scarcely repress an exclamation.  
THE SAME apparition was repeated four or five times during her Seminary on the principal feasts of the Blessed Virgin. This apparition seemed to have no other end than to increase in the Sister herself tender devotion to Mary Immaculate.  
Clothed with the habit, Sister Biqueyburu was sent to Blangy and shortly after her arrival, September 8, 1840, feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin, she was favored during prayer with an apparition of the Mother of God, who held in her right hand her Heart surmounted by flames, and in her left a sort of scapular.

The groom was attended by John Santucci, his brother, as best man. Ushers included: Ramon Nunez, cousin of the bride; Frank Pugliese, Eugene D'Amico and Louis Laurino.  
Lieut. Santucci is stationed at the Charleston Air Force Base in South Carolina.

**Booths, Exhibits On Fatima Planned**  
Plainfield, N.J.—(NC)—A program to provide "Message of Fatima" promotional booths at fairs and exhibitions throughout the country was launched by the Blue Army in honor of the Marian Year.  
The group, dedicated to achieving world peace through prayer and sacrifice as outlined by Our Lady of Fatima, will supply the decorated booths and literature on the Fatima apparitions. The booths will be manned in each section by local Blue Army members.  
"It is an appropriate time for the Blue Army to launch a campaign of this type," the founder, Father Harold V. Colgan of St. Mary's Church here, stated, "since the Blue Army is dedicated to the Blessed Virgin through the peace plan she gave us at Fatima."

**Refugee Germans Live In Camps**  
Cologne (NC)—More than 200,000 men, women and children who escaped from the Soviet Zone of Germany are still finding temporary shelter in West German refugee camps, according to figures released by the German Catholic Caritas organization.  
The German Caritas has organized a special camp service to bring spiritual and material aid to these refugees. This camp service closely cooperates with War Relief Services—National Catholic Welfare Conference.  
"According to a report of the West Berlin Economic Research Institute, close to 350,000 East Germans took refuge in the West during 1953, resulting in a net drop of the East Zone population of 300,000. The population of East Germany at the end of 1952 was estimated at 17,300,000, that of West Germany at close to 50,000,000."

IF YOUR GROUP counts among its members some book-lovers, or if you can invite some guest "book experts" you might try some sort of a Quiz the Panel Program. For such a program it is suggested that there be a Master of Ceremonies and a panel of four.  
You may either plan a Twenty Question Type quiz or use Charades. With this idea of book charades you might ask ten or twelve members of the organization to come to the meeting wearing something representative of a new book and by pantomime to interpret the title.  
All these programs call for careful planning, so we mention them several weeks before the opening of Catholic Press Month. The results should be an increase of interest in Catholic reading, and since Catholic reading forms the Catholic Mind we are exerting ourselves in a most worthwhile undertaking.
