How purely fortuitous it seemed for a man named Simon from the land of Cyrene to stand watching Our Lord going to His death. But the long arm of the Roman law made him immortal. Every Catholic for centuries has met Simon at the Fifth Station.

Behold the greatness of Christ! You go down one road rather than another, and your whole life is changed thereby. Stenos, Typists Wanted By State

Do you have friends or relatives looking for a permanent job as a stenographer or typist? Tell them about the State's continuous examining program to fill vacancies in these job titles in State service. There are vacancies in many locations. People who are interested should write or telephone Grace Murray, New York State Employment Service, 155 West Main Street, Rochester 14, New York—T.O. 6800 (or your nearest State Employment Service office).

THE TESTS qualify applicants for permanent stenographer or typist jobs in State service. Successful candidates may be appointed immediately if there are vacancies, or placed on an eligible list for filling future vacancies. The annual salary starts at \$2180 and increases to \$2985 in five annual increments. Candidates do not have to meet any minimum education or experience requirements. Typists must pass a basic written test and a typing test, at 40 words a minute. Stenographers must also take a dictation test at 80 words a minute and transcribe their notes satisfactorily.

Mass Offered In Geneva For Captain William Glunz

Geneva—A Solemn High Mass with military honors was celebrated Saturday in St. Francis de Sales Church in memory of Capt. William J. Glunz, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Glunz, 12 Genesee St.

Capt. Glunz, missing in action in Korea, since Nov. 1950, has been declared officially dead by the Department of the Army.

The Very Rev. Edward K. Ball, V.F., celebrated the Mass with the Rev. John L. McLoughlin, deacon, and the Rev. Walter Caron, sub-deacon. Lt. Rudy Cosentino, U.S. Army, Seneca Falls, was in charge of military rites. Thomas Corcoran, commander of Winnek Post, American Legion, headed a Legion delegation and Francis Mahoney, Veterans of Foreign Wars post commander, headed the VFW delegation.

Also present were delegations from Thomas Cannell Post with Commander Joseph Crupi and the Disabled American Veterans with Vice-Commander Dominic Crupi. Organist was Mrs. Anita Kitcho, Mrs. Thomas Kane sang the offertory of the Mass.

Among relatives present were Mr. and Mrs. Richard Baybutt, Rochester; Mr. and Mrs. Henry Glunz, Binghamton, and Mr. and Mrs. James Dessone and daughter, Cella, Elmira.

Mr. and Mrs. Glunz were notified that their son is now presumed to be dead. The families of Cpl. George W. Conklin Jr., Phelps, and Pfc. Herbert E. Davle, Stanley, received similar notices earlier this week.

Capt. Glunz was graduated from Geneva High School in 1942 and from the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1945. He served with the U. S. occupation forces in Japan until 1947, and then returned to this country. In June, 1950, he returned to Japan as a member of General Douglas MacArthur's staff.

After twice requesting combat duty, he was assigned to the Second Infantry Division in August, 1950. Three months later he was reported missing. He is survived by his parents.

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
