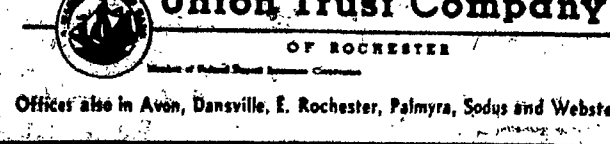

CYA To Conduct Red Cross Senior Life-Saving Course

The CYA Red Cross Senior Life Saving Course for boys and girls will get under way at Columbus Civic Center on Monday, Feb. 1 at 8 p.m.

Anyone 16 years of age or over is eligible, provided they are good swimmers. The class will meet every Monday night for two hours and will comprise all phases of life saving, boat safety and water safety.

Older high school and college students are asked to take special notice as successful completion of this course certifies them to accept positions at public and private pools, beaches and camps during the summer months.

Students will be awarded Red Cross certificates in Senior Life Saving.

Registrations are now being taken by signing up at the CYA Pool Office, or by calling in the reservation through BAKER 7400, Ext. 10.
