Evidence Library

The Catholic Evidence Library of Rochester, located in Columbus Civic Center, offers an example of the way in which a group of 100 U. S. Catholics can spread the influence of the Catholic press.

Early in November 1933 the Library observed the twentieth anniversary of its Mrs. Snyder founding. I have a report of that meeting from which I shall quote today.

Miss Marlon Warner, librarian in charge, presented the speaker of the evening, the Rev. Benedict Ehmann, pastor of St. Mary's of the Lake, Watkins Glen, with these words:

"Twenty years ago, Father Benedict Ehmann sensed the need of distributing Catholic truth and literature. So, he gave his own books as a nucleus for the present library. He not only gave his books but he gave his time, his talents, and his money. He organized a corps of workers. We have two of them with us still: Mrs. Charlotte Gardiner and Miss Lucy Sheehan."
