## Musa Caravan To Mark Site Of First Church, Cathedral

Commemoration of the site of the first Catholic Church established in the limits of the city of Rochester and of old St. Patrick's Cathedral by erection of a suitable plaque at Platt Street and Plymouth Ave. North is being planned by Musa Caravan, Order of the Alhambra according to Grand Commander Clifford B. Sargent.

The plaque is planned for a spot on the Eastman Kodak Company building now on the site of old St. Patrick's, Sargent said.

The Alhambra order has for its purposes, sociability and the marking of Catholic historical places. A plaque stands at Dan's Corners on the road to Lima which was erected by the Order to mark the early Catholic missionaries in the area.

A COMMITTEE headed by former Supreme Commander Norman A. O'Brien has been working for several months on the possibility of marking the Cathedral site. Erection of the marker is planned for St. Patrick's Day, March 17.

The project according to Grand Commander Sargent, has the approval of His Excellency Bishop Kearney who has been asked to dedicate the marker and of the Eastman Kodak Company. Arrangements with the Kodak Company which in 1937 purchased the land on which the old Cathedral stood were made through Howard R. Patterson, the company's Director of Facilities.

With Past Grand Commander O'Brien on the committee are Past Commanders Donald E. Woerner who is designing the plaque and Emmett J. Schupp with Grand Commander Sargent.
