

Pre-Marriage Courses Set By 2 Deanery DCCW Units

Pre-Marriage Courses for young persons in Geneva and Rochester were announced this week by the deanery units of Rochester Diocesan Council of Catholic Women sponsoring the courses. Plans were announced as follows:

The Marriage Preparation Course to be conducted on six Monday evenings during Lent will open in Powers Hotel, Rochester on Monday, March 7 at 8:15 p.m., the Rev. Louis J. Hohman, moderator of Rochester Diocesan Council of Catholic Women announced today.

Speakers for the opening sessions will be the Rev. Albert J. Shamon of St. Andrew's Seminary faculty, Moderator for the series will be the Rev. Daniel V. Hogan who is also moderator of Rochester Deanery Council, DCCW sponsoring the Pre-Cana discussions.

All engaged couples will be welcome to attend the Monday meetings during Lent in Powers Hotel. The series is intended to supplement rather than supplant marriage instructions given by their pastors, Father Hohman said.

Three hundred persons attended the courses in 1953 and it is expected, the attendance will grow during 1954.
