Art Exhibit Held For High Schools

Scholastic Magazine, co-sponsored by Sibley, Lindsay and Curr Company, will hold the twelfth exhibition of high school art in the Fourth Floor Gallery of Sibley's store, from Feb. 20 through March 6.
