

"Your organization gives an example and important lesson to the community in what you did this morning, for an essential factor in patriotism is a belief in God and practice of your faith."

The Jesuit educator warned that in controversies such as raging about McCarthyanism "no organization labeled Catholic must be forced into a position to defend every single action of an individual."

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Father Foy traced the close association historically between church and school and said that in this country the Catholic church has 3,549 schools accommodating some 2 1/2 million students. Catholics feel that their school system is important, stressing the ten commandments and precepts of charity and instruction concerning God along with the "three R's."

EDUCATION started with the church and continued with the engagement of churches until 110 years ago, said the speaker, when Horace Mann started his movement to secularize education, making it available to everyone. "The Catholic church, however, he continued, contended that it is the soul that is most important and that life on earth is preparation for life thereafter, therefore the church aims in its schools to combine religious instruction with other courses, teaching four and not three R's.

"Isn't it strange," said Father Foy, "that New York state permits in its public schools prayer to God about whom the teachers can not teach." Released time for religious instruction is good, he added, but not sufficient, hence the parochial schools which aim to turn out good Catholic Americans.
