Rally Speakers Pledge Drive Support, Hit Indecent Literature For Children

A determined campaign to rid the Elmira area of the highly objectionable literature now appearing on newsstands was inaugurated in Elmira last Sunday night when nearly 450 members of the Elmira Deane Council of Holy Name Societies, the Elmira Deane Council of the National Council of Catholic Women and the Knights of Columbus, attended a rally at St. Mary's auditorium.

Plans for the campaign were outlined by Rev. Albert V. Ryan, moderator of Elmira Deane Council, NCCW and program chairman. Father Ryan said that between 90 and 100 retailers would be contacted by teams and asked not to display literature classified as objectionable. Retailers of magazines in Elmira, Elmira Heights and Herkules were contacted starting Monday in the start of a concerted effort to rid the stands of the objectionable literature.

Teams of men will contact the dealers the first three days of this week and their work will be followed up immediately by representatives of the women's groups. The men's group will report tonight to Daniel F. Kennedy and the women's group will report on Sunday to Mrs. Francis B. O'Connor, Kennedy, president of the Elmira Deane Council of Holy Name Societies and Mrs. O'Connor, president of the Elmira Deane Council, NCCW area chairmen of the campaign.
