

Marian Year Answer To Atom Bomb Says Fr. Tuite

Hornell—The Marian Year is the answer to the atom bomb, the Rev. Paul E. Tuite of Rochester told a First Saturday luncheon group in the Moose Home in Hornell March 6.

Father Tuite was principal speaker at the luncheon attended by 96 women from Hornell and vicinity. The luncheon was another in a series sponsored by Hornell District Diocesan Council of Catholic Women in honor of Our Lady of Fatima.

"Our Blessed Mother in her appearances at Fatima, emphasized the permanent peace would come to the world only through prayer and sacrifice," Father Tuite said.

"We, through the great law of charity, have an obligation to our fellow man to do all in our power to promote that peace by following Our Lady of Fatima's wishes," he continued.

"Mary, the Mediatric of all graces, is a powerful advocate before the throne of the Divine Son. God came to us through Mary and we go to God through Mary. She is not only our means of salvation, but our exemplar. Since Mary gave us the Author of all grace, it is logical that He send all His graces to us through Her," he said.

TO INCREASE devotion and understanding of Mary, the priest suggested meditative prayer, or placing one's self in spirit at the side of Mary during events in her earthly life.

"Picture yourselves making the journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem with Mary and St. Joseph directly before the birth of Christ. Although there were many hardships in the 30-mile trip, Mary was serene because she had perfect confidence in God.

"Mary, the first Christoper of Christ carrier, was untroubled because she was in complete conformity with the Will of God. He told the group, He summarized the spiritual advantages in imitation of Mary's virtues of trust in God and acceptance of His Will.

Meditation on the Crucifixion of Christ was suggested by Father Tuite. He advised the group to stand in spirit at the foot of the Cross with Christ's Mother Mary.

"It is not difficult to feel sincere sorrow when reflecting on this scene because we know it was our sins which nailed Christ to the Cross," Father Tuite said.

FATHER TUITE was introduced by the Rev. Robert MacNamara, assistant pastor of St. Ann's, who is spiritual director of the Hornell District DCCW. Father MacNamara emphasized the spiritual benefits which may be derived during the Marian Year by prayers and penance for the intention of an enduring world peace.

Miss Virginia Husong, president of the Hornell District, presided as toastmistress. She expressed appreciation to the Evening Tribune for its "generous recognition of the spiritual significance of the Lenten season," evidenced by its column, "Three Minutes A Day."

She welcomed a group of Socially members, who were seated at the head table. Gratitude was expressed Mrs. H. C. Ordway for the table decoration.

"It was a large shrine of the Blessed Virgin, Daffodils and emblems were massed on the broad steps leading to a statue of Mary, the Immaculate Conception. Three seven-branch candelabra bore lighted tapers. The shrine was surmounted by a huge gold cross.

Stained Glass Exhibit Opens In Corning Center

Corning—An art exhibit of interest to readers of the Catholic Courier-Journal and especially appropriate during the current Lenten Season, opened in The Museum of Glass at the Corning Glass Center in Corning, Monday and will continue through April 30.

The art show, open to the public without charge daily, except Mondays 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., is a special two-part exhibition representing the traditional and the new in stained glass.

The first part of the exhibition, entitled "Traditional Stained Glass by a Contemporary Master Lawrence Saint," is the first exhibition devoted to the masterful works of this accomplished artist. The exhibit was designed and installed by members of the Museum staff and will continue through April 30.

LAWRENCE SAINT is an acknowledged master of the art of stained glass, and this exhibition of his work illustrates the step-by-step process in making stained glass windows in the medieval tradition.

In making his exhaustive study of stained glass, Saint established a studio and glassmaking plant with a special furnace where he painstakingly worked out some 1,300 formulas for stained glass with special emphasis on color and optical qualities.

Featured in the exhibition are Saint's original illustrations for the book "Stained Glass of the Middle Ages in England and France" which have been loaned by the Carnegie Institute, Pittsburgh, Pa.

It is interesting to note that one of Saint's most prominent works is the north transept rose window in the Washington Cathedral.

THE SECOND part of the exhibition, "New Works in Stained Glass," is being circulated by the American Federation of Arts. Scheduled to continue through April 7, the exhibition represents the works of 18 contemporary American artists.
