St. Joseph's House

Every evening at 5:45, over 70 homeless men are fed at Saint Joseph's House of Hospitality at 402 South Avenue. The House is a non-profit organization run by Catholic men

and women, all of whom voluntarily give their time and services.

The group is an outgrowth of the Catholic Worker movement begun in New York City about 1930 by Peter Maurin. The immediate purpose of this movement was to help feed the thousands of poor people during the depression.

About 1935, a group of students from St. Bernard's Seminary, Aquinas Institute and Nazareth College heard of the success of the Houses in New York and other cities.

They decided to start a similar project in Rochester. Under the direction of Rev. Benedict Ehmman, they obtained a site on Elmira Street and began to build as many of the needy as possible.

Five years later, the group moved to the present three-story building on South Avenue. Until recently, Rev. George Vogt was chaplain at the House.

IN THE NEAR future plans call for the opening of a dormitory on the second floor. The workers thus hope to provide sleeping facilities in a pleasant environment for many of the men who cannot afford them.

Many other plans have been laid to help these men feel that people are really interested in them and care about them.

Today — appropriately the Feast of Saint Joseph — marks the opening of a Subscription Drive for interested people to join the Saint Joseph's House Society's Club. All that is required is a willingness to pledge \$1, \$2, or \$5 a month for operation of the House. Contributions are deductible from income taxes. (See coupon elsewhere on this page).

Food and clothing donations are always welcome. Call Empire 1086, and the House truck will stop by for the articles. For the proposed dormitory are needed the following: sheets, pillows, beds, and mattresses. Sanitary facilities need to be improved, for example, installation

of showers, a drinking fountain, etc. The public — lay and religious are cordially invited to attend an "Open House" to be held at Saint Joseph's House this coming Sunday, March 21st from 2:30 p.m. The address is 402 South Avenue.

All who contribute physically or spiritually to the House will be rewarded in knowing that from Christ's lips: "as long as you did it for one of these, the least of my brethren, you did it for me." But then, what greater reward is there?

participate in the Rosary and are made to feel free to talk to any of the workers. There is no coercion of any sort placed upon them, and the first step must always be made by the men.

This type of work bears fruit slowly. People do not change overnight. But the knowledge that they may be helping these men to come closer to God more than compensates for the efforts of the workers.

In order to finance the work of the House, an appeal has been made each year at Christmas time. Letters requesting contributions are sent to various organizations and individuals in the city.

Response to the appeal this year (\$2600) has enabled the workers to make certain much needed repairs and improvements. Friends of the House, donating their services, have recently put in a new heating unit, a new floor covering and painted the rooms on the first floor.

THE MEN WHO came to the House in the 1930's were, for the most part, physically-poor. They were unable to buy the necessary food and clothing because of a lack of steady employment.

The men who come today, however, are, for the most part, spiritually poor as well. They are unable to face the problems of everyday life. Consequently, many attempt to hide from reality through drink. These men are still poor, but this is only an effect of their spiritual poverty.

The workers at Saint Joseph's House realize that the only way these men will be able to readjust their lives is through desire for improvement, and this must come from a renewed faith in God and themselves.

The immediate needs of these men are still food and clothing, but if their problem is to be solved, they must have religious assistance.

Recently, a Legion of Mary was organized among some of the workers in order to bring this assistance to the men. Under the chaplaincy of Rev. Raymond Kehny of Saint A. drew's Seminary, the Legion is striving to place greater emphasis on the spiritual works at the House.

AS PART OF their program, the Legion members recite the Rosary after the meal each night. Then they talk to any of the men who seem interested. The men are encouraged to par-
