"If one out of every 60 of the N.C.C.W.'s 8,000,000 strong gives a food parcel in this Marian Year, 133,000 refugee families will receive strengthening food and consolation.

With her permission I quote a portion of Mrs. R.'s letter: "I am 65 years old though I feel much younger and look it so my friends say. Fortunately, my husband, who died five years ago, left enough of this world's goods so that I need not worry on that score. I can live frugally but nicely without seeking employment. (Besides, who would hire me!)

"Did I get 'off the beam' somewhere? Or are all women my age lonely? Nobody knows I feel this way and with the anonymity of a woman from Virginia could you or your readers suggest something for me to do to fill these empty days?"
Well, Mrs. R., my own first reaction was, "Go over and take care of those six grandchildren and have fun doing it while your daughter tends to school and parish duties." (Possibly that first reaction was impelled by the fact that our one-and-only grandchild is 3000 miles away.) Perhaps, though, six would be a bit appalling to someone who had never handled them wholesale. So, if you're not "Grandma, the push-over" baby-sitter" relieved to in a recent magazine article, still there are many new experiences to all those empty days.
IS THERE A Golden Age Club in your town? Or in the city near you? These community-sponsored organizations have many projects: art, music, needlework. There men and women find interesting hobbies, talents they never knew they possessed and, best of all, friendships.
There must be parish work, too: Legion of Mary, Altar Society Sodality even though it be only writing cards or telephone calls. It's surprising how the willing hand is extended to the willing one.
