Expert Job Advice Offered At Nazareth In Current Vocation Guidance Program

What are some of the job possibilities open to women college graduates? What are the requirements for success in these occupations? What is the work like? How about the pay? Any chances for advancement? What is the best type of preparation? Are there any intangible rewards? Any disadvantages in this particular line of work?

To provide its students with specific and forthright answers to questions such as these, and to assist them in their choices of careers if they have not already made the decision, Nazareth College is currently conducting a series of vocational guidance lectures as part of its general guidance program.

DESIGNED PRIMARILY for freshmen and sophomores, the meetings are open to all interested students and attendance is optional.

Experts in the various fields—many of them alumnae of the Catholic women's college—are cooperating to give the students the realistic information they desire along with the benefit of their own experience. Nine meetings, each of which is devoted to a particular profession or vocational area, make up the agenda. Jobs for science majors in the medical field, the college woman in business and industry, civil service positions for college women, opportunities in the teaching and library professions, and medical missionary work are the subjects thus far discussed.

Sister Eva Marie, director of vocational guidance and of the college placement bureau, organized the series around interests expressed by students. **THE SEVENTH** session is scheduled for Sunday afternoon, April 4, when a panel will discuss job opportunities for liberal arts graduates who are academic majors. Expected to participate are the following, all Nazareth College graduates: Miss Ruth Elgie, director of the Charles Settlement House; Miss Helene Donnelly, mathematics technician in the Eastman Kodak Co. research department; Miss Rosemary Cullota, editor of the Rochester Medical Association Bulletin.

Also, Miss Marie Collins, of the B. Foreman Co. advertising department; Miss Ruth McNamara, special librarian for the General Foods Co.; Mrs. Gladys Englert Kipp, former bank employee; Miss Harriet Hook, secretary to the Rochester Board of Education; Miss Dorothy Rice, librarian at Brighton High School; Miss Mary Mans, history teacher at West High School; and Miss Joan Lynch, secretary for the Eastman Kodak Co.

NEXT WEEK Mrs. Helen Malone Redman, also an alumna and former guidance counselor at East Rochester High School, will

discuss student personnel work and vocational counseling. Sister Paulette, chairman of the Nazareth College sociology department, is due to discuss social work in the final session.

Last week four alumnae explained some of the vocational opportunities for chemistry or biology majors. They are Miss Elaine Kahl, medical technologist for the Veterans Administration; Miss Hilda DiGullo, teacher of nurses at Highland Hospital; Mrs. Alfreda Galbrida Siskie, research worker at the University of Rochester medical laboratory; and Miss Sarah Call, physiotherapist at Strong Memorial Hospital.

Two visiting nurses also contributed to the program last week by describing the work of their order, the Society of Catholic Medical Missionaries. They are Sister Charles, who is on her way to New Delhi, India, and Sister DeMontfort, whose assignment is the African Gold Coast.

Miss Grace Murray, head of the women's division of the New York State Employment Service, in discussing the college woman in business and industry, stressed the value of a liberal education in all fields. Also an alumna of Nazareth College, she said such an education lays the foundation for success in any specialization.

Sister Joseph Mary, chairman of the education department described teaching as a profession which gives opportunity for service, for working with people and for one's own development. She pointed out that opportunities for placement are great and noted that teaching is indirectly good preparation for family living.

CIVIL SERVICE openings on the local, state and national level were described by Sister Eva Marie. Social workers, biologists, chemists, business majors, librarians, mathematicians and nurses are among those she mentioned as being needed by county and state agencies.

Harold S. Hacker, director of the Rochester Public Library, pointed out that there are many opportunities for young women in his profession, which he described as "progressive and inter-

esting." There is not only a great shortage of librarians in Rochester, he said, but the shortage is nationwide.

THESE VOCATIONAL guidance lectures, according to Sister Eva Marie, constitute but one activity of her department, whose purpose is to help students make and carry out plans for their careers and to place students after graduation in positions for which they are best suited. She added that her department is only one part of the college's counseling program.

Because, as Pope Pius XI stated, "the subject of Christian education is man whole and entire," the college aims at the intellectual, social, moral and emotional growth of the student as well as vocational preparation. Under the direction of Sister Rose Angela, Jean, the college furnishes guidance in all these respects. Sister Saint Catherine, dean of studies, gives particular assistance with academic problems; the class Faculty Adviser, with social activities; and the college chaplain, the Rev. William H. Shannon, with spiritual and emotional matters. Since the college is small, each member of the faculty, aware of the special needs of its students, acts as counselor.

Each freshman, moreover, is assigned a special faculty counselor with whom she meets frequently during her first two years. In her junior and senior years her counselor is a professor from her major department. Such standardized measuring devices as intelligence, personality, interest, aptitude and achievement tests, which are administered regularly, provide objective data on which much of the counseling is based.
