

Bishop Kearney Breaks Ground For New Carmelite Monastery

His Excellency Bishop James E. Kearney turned the first earth for the site of the new Carmelite Monastery on Jefferson Rd., Pittsford, on Palm Sunday, Apr. 11.

In addressing the gathering of some 200 spectators, the Bishop said: "Every one of the Carmelite monasteries is a new Bethlehem. From here the Son of God will come to take up dwelling in this community. From here the Lord will operate. Anything we do to multiply the Bethlehems will serve the community."

MANY OF THE diocesan clergy were present, but only one representative of the seventeen Sisters of Carmel, observed the rite, which is in keeping with the rules of the Order.

The present monastery is located at 1530 East Ave. The new building will house a public chapel and a bell tower in addition to the nun's accommodations. The site is just opposite Locust Hill Country Club.

Nazareth Deans Attend Regents Board Convocation

Sister Rose Angela, dean of Nazareth College, and Sister Saint Catherine, dean of studies, reported favorably on the anniversary convocation of the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York which they attended in Albany, Thursday and Friday, Apr. 8 and 9.

"Unity in Education with Diversity" Under the Board of Regents was the theme of the convocation. It marked the 170th anniversary of the establishment of the Board, the 100th anniversary of the founding of a separate department of public instruction in the state, and the 50th anniversary of the creation of the present state education department under the Board of Regents.

SISTER ROSE ANGELA said she was particularly impressed by the addresses of Frank P. Taylor, former president of the University of the State of New York and Commissioner of Education; Harold E. Stassen, director of the Foreign Opera-

tions Administration; and Jan Herman van Rijen, ambassador to the United States from the Netherlands. In connection with the last-named, she pointed out that the first school in New York State was built by the Dutch in 1683.

The dean also singled out for special praise the address by Dr. Mark Van Doren, professor of English at Columbia University, on "The Future Significance of the Liberal Arts" delivered before an assemblage of college and university representatives; and the one by Dr. Clarence E. Manion, former dean of the Law School of Notre Dame University, at a general session.

OTHER SPEAKERS included Dr. Samuel M. Brownell, United States Commissioner of Education; Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; Gov. Thomas E. Dewey; Dr. Francis M. Crowley, dean of the Fordham University School of Education; Dr. Abram Leon Sacher, president of Brandeis University; and Charles P. Taft, former president of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America.

Among the session themes were "The Role of Education in a Free World, Our Moral and Cultural Resources, Basic Issues Facing Education, The Future of the Professions, Our Material and Human Resources, and The Foundations and Future of American Education."
