Corning Police Chief Links Delinquency, Broken Homes

Corning - A talk by a St. Mary's parishioner, Police Chief Roman J. Laurence, before members of the local John P. Eaton Post, American Legion, has won the praise of local religious, civic and service leaders as the true thoughts behind juvenile delinquency which is striking the nation.

Introduced by Past Commander Clarence F. Remer, chairman of a committee for Legion Child Welfare Month, Chief Laurence laid delinquency at the doors of broken homes.

"WE MUST regard it as a disease and a problem," he declared. "We must go into the cause and effects of this disease and fix the responsibility for it. Then we can take preventative and corrective measures."

"Delinquency is the anti-social, anti-moral behavior of modern human beings from the cradle to adulthood. While it is not a major problem here, thanks to School Supts. William E. Severn and Hugh W. Gregg and to all of the teachers, it is a major problem in the country today."

"Its cause takes us back to the time of the war when parents not in the armed forces thought it was their patriotic duty to work in defense plants. This work gave them the opportunity to realize and attain many things they had been deprived of for years. They had found a new power."

"Children were neglected while parents worked. Natural curiosity led the children to misbehave. They tried new stunts ranging in seriousness from shoplifting to malicious mischief. They had no intention of being dishonest or mean but they were without proper guidance."

"AS WAR conditions tapered off, parents felt that they could not stop working and earning. There was a breaking down of home life and the forgotten children were without the companionship of the persons they idolized—their parents," Laurence asserted.

He charged that the New York system of progressive education is the brainchild of Communists, "a method to bore within and sew the seeds of wildness in young hearts and minds."

"The Communists," he asserted, "are just waiting for the children to grow up with communist desires. Then, they will use them."

Chief Laurence cited several cases in which delinquency might have developed.

"Too often," he said, "we find children waiting in cars or roaming the streets while their parents are in cafes. If the parents get drunk, you can imagine what happens when the family reaches its so-called home."

He urged a return to "old home" conditions, with children enjoying the companionship and love of their parents.

"Turn back the clock," he said. "Live with God; with God, with family and with friends."
