### Cardinal Mooney Urges Support In UN Body

Detroit — (NC) — Catholic women were urged by His Eminence Edward Cardinal Mooney, Archbishop of Detroit, to "get behind and promote" the United Nations.

Addressing a convention of the Detroit Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women, the Cardinal said too many Catholics lag behind the Holy Father in their social thinking. "This is especially true in regard to the United Nations," he added.

His Eminence said the resolutions adopted by the archdiocesan council demonstrated the "social consciousness" of its members, and he called upon them to support the international organization.

CONCEDING THAT the UN is by no means an ideal instrument of international cooperation, Cardinal Mooney nevertheless reminded the delegates that some form of world organization is a necessity of natural law. Like the family and the state, a society of nations is demanded by man's social nature, he said.

The Cardinal quoted from the discourse of Pope Pius XII to Italian jurists last December: "The Holy Father spoke of 'the institution of a community of nations, which today has been partly realized. But which is striving to be established and consolidated upon a higher and more perfect level.'" and said

(N.C.W.C. News Service) A midnight Easter Mass was reported to have been celebrated for members of the foreign colony in Moscow by Father George Bissonette, an Assumptionist of Pawtucket, R. I., who is the only American priest in the Soviet capital.

Reports said that the Mass was celebrated in Spasso House, the residence of U. S. Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen. Father Bissonette was unable to offer the Mass in the Church of St. Louis of the French, because this church — the only Catholic worship center in Moscow — has been closed to him by the Soviet authorities.
