Fun With Children

In last week's column I ended with a quotation from Dr. Frances Horowitz. The Miss Frances of "Ding Dong School" is an almost evangelical fervor that Miss Frances urges her viewers, the adults at home with the children watching the telecast, to "Have fun with your children."

As I have remarked before, one of the penalties which the modern mother pays for the advancement of the science of child care is a lack of confidence in her own native abilities. It would seem that the modern mother is so conscious that so many people know so much more than she does about the proper care and raising of her child that she feels inadequate in making the simple decisions regarding the child.

Statistics prove beyond doubt that modern science has given every baby a better chance for a better life because of its research into preventive medicine, nutrition and all the sciences related to child care. However, all

of these are intended as aids to the parents and not as substitutes for them. IN MY LIPS time I have seen the pendulum of child care swing from one extreme to the other. About twelve years ago we were astonished, for example, against rocking the baby or picking him up if he were crying. Mothers of today are told to be sure to rock the baby and never to let him cry and to pick him up and console him with soothing words and loving pats.

Examples could be multiplied endlessly: three or four hour feeding schedules, formerly de rigueur, are now superseded by the demand feeding system. Somehow or other, in spite of all this shifting of scientific outlook—or perhaps because of it—the modern parent, and particularly the modern mother, has emerged with the thought that any Ph. D. knows more about the raising of her own child than she does.

If that statement sounds harsh, just attend a few meetings of mothers' groups and listen to the questions which the visiting expert is always asked. Or sit around a luncheon table or a bridge table and listen to the conversation of the mothers

THAT IS WHY I feel that when Miss Frances says, "Have fun with your children," she says it with a firm conviction that many modern parents are not doing just that.

And having fun with our children does not postulate that we must pass out days in senseless, pointless merriment. It's fun to read with our children, to visit local points of religious or historical interest, to share in their favorite television shows (and not use the time as an opportunity to do something more pleasing to ourselves to let them help with safe household projects.

If we are making a problem of parenthood, our solution lies in turning to Our Blessed Mother. We can never envision her as creating a problem out of any situation. With her "Fat," her "Let it be done unto me, according to Thy word," she put herself and her concerns firmly in the hands of Almighty God. We can do the same.
