WHY is giving easier for the poor than the rich? One reason is that the poor man's view of the essentials of life is not obscured by a wall of THINGS. For example, if you asked a poor woman to take a chance on the most expensive, latest model automobile to help some charity, she might turn you down; but if you told her there was a hungry child in the local orphanage she would empty her purse in your hands. The reason is this: those who are really charitable need no entertainment to give. All they have to know is that somebody is suffering.

Those who are not used to giving must often be "encouraged" into doing so by bazaars, dances, bridges and the opportunity to win prizes. These forms of painless giving are employed first because people who do not practice giving do not know how to give otherwise and secondly direct giving often embarrasses people. The discomfort rises from the fact that luxury in the face of poverty reads its own unworthiness and cannot bear to look.

The Society for the Propagation of the Faith has no formula for begging, nor do we have a letterhead with names of famous people who consider this a worthy cause. Because we help the poor we appeal to the poor in spirit. We promise no automobiles; we simply say, "There are many who suffer and go hungry."
