Hasenauer To Leave Post As Aquinas Music Director


Rev. John H. O'Loane, C.S.B., principal of Aquinas Institute announced with regret today that Raymond J. Hasenauer, director of music at Aquinas will leave his position at the close of the school year in June to enter the school music service business.

Mr. Hasenauer has been with Aquinas Institute for 22 years ever since 1932. Previous to that he was director of band and orchestra for four years at Madison High School, Rochester.

In 1934, Mr. Hasenauer presented to the students of Aquinas two songs—the stately "Aquinas Alma Mater" and the spirited "March on Aquinas" which have become a cherished memory of every Aquinas student.

During the past 22 years, the musical organizations under Mr. Hasenauer have enjoyed a fine reputation, having performed for hundreds of school and civic functions. Aquinas can point with pride to the accomplishments of its musical groups, namely the concert band and marching band, the orchestra, the glee club, the Maroon and White Swingsters, and the liturgical choir.

During the second world war the Aquinas Band gave liberally

to the war effort by appearing frequently at war bond rallies and parades.

THE PERFORMANCES of the Aquinas Band at the football games were witnessed by hundreds of thousands of people. It was Mr. Hasenauer who arranged and taught all the music and formations for these games. In leaving Aquinas Mr. Hasenauer states that he takes with him many pleasant memories of the fine associations that he has had with his musical organizations, and also the happy contacts with present and former students, faculty members and administration.

FATHER O'LOANE issued the following statement when informed of Mr. Hasenauer's decision. "In his twenty-two years at Aquinas, Raymond Hasenauer identified himself with the School. He was completely unselfish, thoroughly cooperative and sincerely loyal to students, colleagues and administrations. "His most lasting monument, in addition to the musical reputation Aquinas acquired at his hands, is the admiration and appreciation of thousands of Aquinas students, and of the priests, religious and lay-teachers who through those years worked by his side. May the blessing of God be with Raymond Hasenauer in his new field of work."
