AMONG WOMEN

Impatience

Recently a columnist wrote of the feeling of guilt which she called her Mother's Day when she found herself surrounded with encomia of praise and expressions of filial gratitude. I suppose every conscientious mother has experienced similar pangs of regret; and for most of us the regret would center itself around our impatient children. Frequently, suffer

from the impatience of parents and teachers because the young people, either deliberately or unconsciously, fail to measure up to the standards arbitrarily set up in the adult's mind.

Recently a priest, discussing this matter of impatience with me, suggested that the reason for the impatience must be sought out before any successful system to overcome it can be evolved. He mentioned that his experience had revealed that many mothers are unduly impatient with their children because the little ones do not measure up to the mother's standards of housekeeping. The mother is disturbed because, in the words of the priest, "Her house doesn't look like a movie set."

A FEW MINUTE'S research, using any standard dictionary, will reveal that synonyms of "impatient" are: "hasty, irritable and peevish." And when any of us mothers find our disposition or frame of mind fitting one of these words, we should not be content merely in resolving to try to practice patience. We should earnestly strive to find out why we are impatient and hasty, and irritable and peevish.


Is it because we seem to think more of our living room rug than we do of our children's feelings? Is it that we are more concerned with the judgment of others on our housekeeping methods than we are with letting our children enjoy their own home? Are we letting our concern for material possessions warp our outlook so that things have become to us more important than people?

AND WHEN WE speak of members of a family and their friends enjoying our home, we do not mean to confuse duty and love. It is part of our duty as parents to teach our children how to use correctly the good things God has bestowed upon us. Letting the children enjoy their own home does not mean letting them tear it apart.

Occasionally we all encounter a vain and foolish mother who will say, "Anyone walking into my living room would never know that a child lived in the house." Parenthetically, and I suppose this sentence destroys all paragraph unity, but it is pertinent the child who lives with such a paragon of housekeeping perfection is generally the one who will try to tear down the home of the rest of us.


But to RETURN to impatience. Impatience is not a cause; it is a symptom. Let's be certain that it is not an indication that we are dissatisfied with our children for not living up to unimportant foolish goals we have established for them.
