Joan Benham's party, the "Mohlans," have announced that their main platform is to solve the busline traffic problems by having a row of signs, similar to stop signs, along the busline with room only for double file. This will make departure from school easier and quicker.

Carol Skeet's "Stoicrats" plan to reorganize the Student Government Association into three groups: 1) Legislative, made up of council members; 2) Judicial, made up of court representatives elected in a separate election by the homerooms; 3) Executive, made up of the president and other S.G.A. officers.

Carol Young's "Young Realists," will have as their main platform a change in court procedure, highlighting 1) more respect for the accused and her defense; 2) president will act as judge with councilmen as the questioners; 3) certain common offenses will have set penalties.

SISTER Mary Beatrice, moderator of the S.G.A. comments: "Since this S.G.A. innovation is intended to simulate the democratic process as it is practiced in the United States, I think it will be a valuable experience for the candidates and the electors."

"The candidates will have to show some intelligence and initiative in the formation of a platform; the electors will have an opportunity to observe the leadership ability of the candidates and to make sound judgments on the proposed platform. S.G.A. activity should be

sparked by the campaign."

Preliminary plans for the campaign election were made by the Student Council and the junior class officers.

A senior electoral commission of ten is responsible for the campaign management and will supervise the voting area on election day. This committee is headed by Sue Slink.

Campaign week was this week, May 17-21. During the week, the candidates electioneered, presented their platforms, bargained for bulletin board space, gave impromptu speeches and passed out campaign ribbons, bulletins and souvenirs.

A political rally at the S.G.A. meeting Monday afternoon will climax election activities. Each candidate will speak and each party will stage a five-minute demonstration. How to use the voting machine acquired for the election will also be explained at this meeting.

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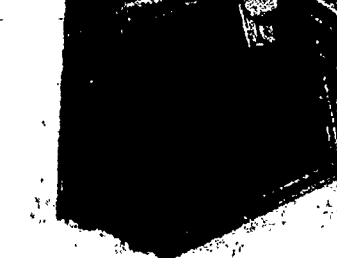
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
