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
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Demonstration Of New Equipment

350 View Equipment At St. James Mercy

Hornell—Equipment added to St. James Mercy Hospital during the past year was viewed by 350 persons Sunday at annual open house in observance of National Hospital Day.

The Women's Board of the hospital sponsored the informal reception from 2 until 5 p.m. Mrs. William M. Jordan was chairman. Members of the hospital staff assisted in arrangements and conducted organized tours throughout the building.

Sister M. Scholastica, assistant superintendent of nurses, with Sister M. Aquinas, hospital superintendent, as advisory chairman, arranged for the visitors to be escorted throughout the various departments.

Each of the hospital departments was staffed by personnel trained to explain and demonstrate the equipment to the guests. Among the additions to the hospital equipment donated within the year by the Women's Board are a Foster bed to facilitate care of orthopedic patients; a new aspirating machine in the pediatrics section, and a noiseless oxygen tent.

IN OBSERVANCE of National Hospital Day, any mother who gave birth to a child Sunday will receive that day's care for herself and infant free. Mrs. Howard Northrup (Edgenia Hale) of Glen Ave. and her daughter, born at 7:36 a.m. yesterday, will have Sunday's hospital expenses deducted from the bill.

The oldest member of the Women's Board also was honored yesterday by an especially conducted wheelchair tour of the hospital. She is Mrs. Mary C. Cleveland of Elmira who was one of the organizers of the Board 64 years ago.

Mrs. Cleveland recalled the first contribution made by the original Board before the turn of the century. A handful of women made a door to door canvass for old sheets and cotton cloth to be used for bandages in the new St. James Mercy Hospital.

She and a few other parishioners of St. Ann's helped prepare the VanSoter home, the original hospital location, for the care of the sick. Among other manual work, they scraped paper from the room walls so they might be painted for greater sanitation.

Mrs. Cleveland still maintains an active interest in the Board. Each year she sends a number of handmade articles to the Aquinas Gift Shop to be sold for the benefit of the hospital.

Tea was served to yesterday's visitors upon the completion of the tour. Mrs. Max Landman Jr., Miss Marcella Snyder and Miss Katherine Linehan poured.

More than 50 persons took advantage of the Hospital Day "special" and received free chest X-rays. The Misses Virginia and Eleanor Fitzgerald assisted in record-keeping.

A SPECIAL BLOOD bank promotion display was arranged by Sister M. Elizabeth Anne to stimulate interest in the next bank to be held at the Bethesda Hospital in June.

The hospital cafeteria was enhanced by a huge shrine erected in honor of the Marian Year. A large statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary, massed with flowers, was enthroned against a white brocade satin backdrop. The shrine bore the caption "Queen of the Universe."

Women's Board Donates Bed To St. James Mercy Hospital

Hornell—An orthopedic bed donated by the Women's Board to St. James Mercy Hospital was demonstrated for the Board at its meeting Friday afternoon.

The bed, which was on display at St. James on Hospital Day, May 16 consists of two detachable frames locked in place at the head and foot ends.

A SAFETY LOCKING device at the head end, when released, permits the patient to be turned completely so that he is lying on his abdomen. A reading board and arm rests also afford comfort to the patient.

The Foster bed is used chiefly for orthopedic injuries, burns and neurologic cases because it permits these patients to be turned as often as necessary for nursing care with little or no exertion on their part.

June McNamara Of Waverly Dies After Auto Accident

Waverly—Miss June Helen McNamara, 24, of 207 Broad Street, Waverly, died Sunday morning, May 16, 1954, at 7:15 o'clock at St. Joseph's hospital, Elmira, of injuries suffered Friday morning when her car went off the road and turned over three times on Route 17 about six miles past of Elmira.

Miss McNamara suffered head, facial and neck injuries and had been carried on the hospital's critical list from the time of her admittance.

Miss McNamara is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis McNamara of Waverly. She was graduated from Waverly Senior High School in 1948. She had been active in the extra-curriculum program of the school and had been named queen of the Junior prom.

She was a member of St. James church and Altar and Rosary society. She was also one of the adult Girl Scout leaders of the St. James troop. At the time of the accident she was employed in the cost accounting and time study department of Westinghouse at Elmira.

Surviving besides her parents are a brother, John, at home, and several aunts and uncles, and nieces and nephews.

The body was at the Luckner Funeral home, Park Ave., Waverly, where funeral services were held Wednesday morning at 8:30, followed by Requiem High Mass at 9:00 in St. James Church. Burial will be in St. James cemetery.

Recitation of the rosary was held Monday evening at the funeral home.

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Hungarian Bishop Released From Jail

Vienna—(RNS)—The Austrian Catholic Press Service reported here that Bishop Joseph Petery of Vac was released from prison a month ago by the Hungarian Communist regime.

According to the report, Bishop Petery was allowed to return to Vac but the administration of his diocese remains in the hands of his Vicar-General, Father Vinco Kovacs, a government appointed "patriotic" priest.

(In New York, a spokesman for the Hungarian National Council said that his office had received information that Bishop

Petery was released "several months ago.")

Bishop Petery was arrested by Communist police shortly after Christmas, 1952. He was charged with refusing to cooperate with the regime's "patriotic" priests' movement. Red press organs at the time accused the prelate of "terrorizing priests with threats of excommunication" if they joined the government-sponsored organization.

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
