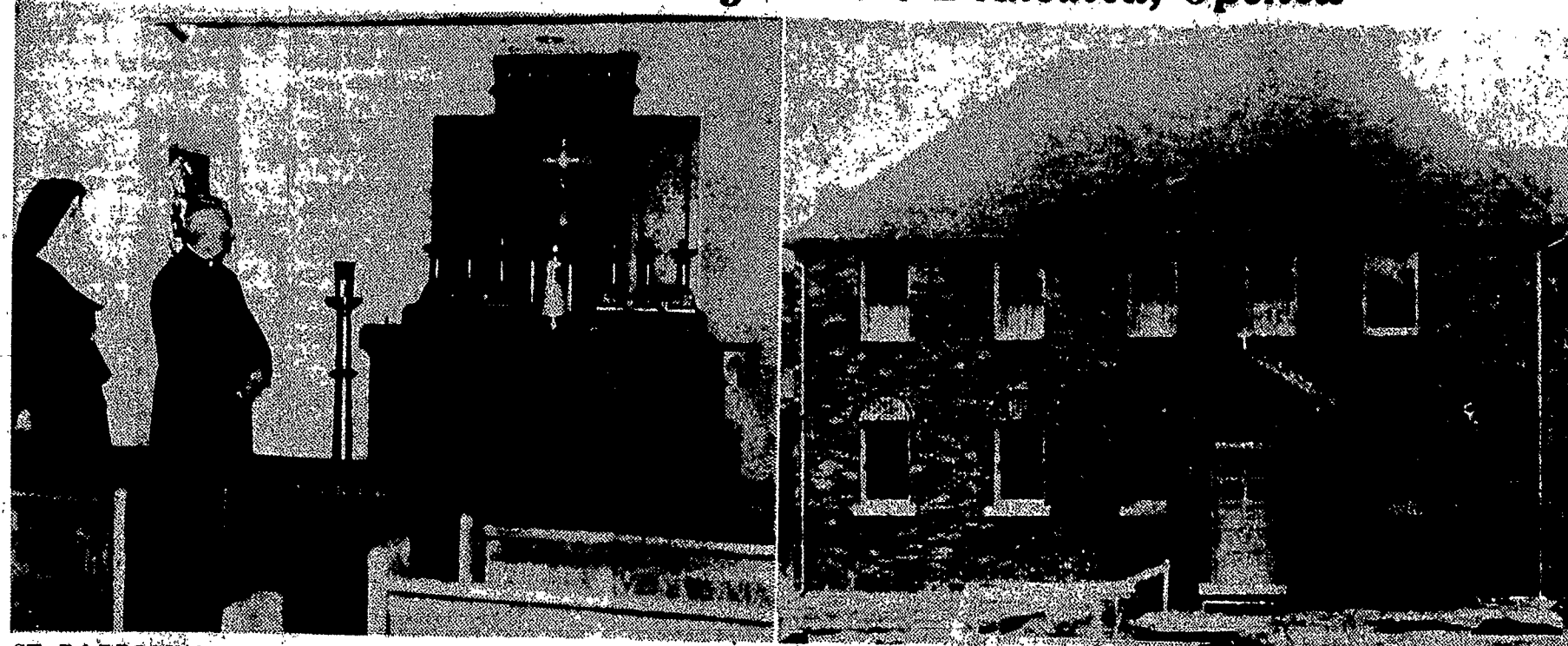

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Bishop Casey Dedicates New St. Patrick Convent

Corning—The new convent of St. Patrick's parish, which has been converted from a former private residence, was occupied for the first time last Saturday and was dedicated last Sunday afternoon by His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey.

The dedication and blessing of the convent took place at 3 p.m. and was followed by a sermon and benediction at the church with the Rev. William M. Canan, pastor, in charge of the services.

The new convent will provide facilities for the housing of 10 Sisters of St. Joseph. The convent now being retired from service as such was constructed about a century ago for four nuns but at present is housing nine. It is situated at the corner of Steuben Street and Denison Parkway.

In order to provide the new convent, the parish purchased the two-apartment residence of Dr. Fred E. Gorman at 254 Denison Parkway, which Dr. Gorman planned to move to a new home at 239 Delaware Avenue. Remodeling operations were started last fall by the general contractor, the Eugene Manning Construction Company.

MOST OF THE interior partitions were removed and entirely new rooms formed, and two additions were built on the structure. In the additions were constructed a chapel, a community room, a work room, part of the kitchen, reception rooms, and additional bedrooms. In the original portion of the building were constructed bathroom facilities, a dining room, bedrooms, part of the kitchen, and stairs and closets.

The alterations have doubled the space available in the building.

Broadcast Set Sunday Of Mass At St. Anthony's

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Junior College Charter Given To Mercy Nuns

Granting of a provisional charter to the Sisters of Mercy for their new Catherine McAuley Junior College located at the Motherhouse of the Sisters of Mercy, 1437 Blossom Road was announced this week by the New York State Board of Regents.

The Board also announced that McQuaid Jesuit High School, to be located at Clinton Ave. South and Elmwood Ave., received a provisional charter as a private secondary school for boys in training in the doctrine and practice of the Catholic Church.

PERMISSION TO conduct three years of college-level courses of study leading to the degree of Associate in Applied Science is granted by the terms of the Catherine McAuley Junior College charter.

The college has been functioning with the approval and under the direct guidance of the State Department of Education since its opening in January 1954, according to Reverend Mother Camilla, President of the College and Mother Superior of the Sisters of Mercy in this diocese. Sister Mary de Pazzi has been named Dean of Instruction.

Although the registration is limited to Sisters of Mercy being trained in Teacher-Education for service in this diocese, several departments of the college which have been integral in its program from the beginning, such as the Reading Laboratory, Speech Clinic, and Testing Center, have become established services in this area.

THE PRESENT registration for Our Lady of Mercy Reading Laboratory represents 25 parochial schools and 28 public schools, "a fairly typical picture of the registration since the opening of the Reading Laboratory three years ago."

Plans are being formulated at the present time for a junior college building which will be an independent unit of the Motherhouse, combining the college and novitiate headquarters.

The present increase of subjects necessitates expansion of the Motherhouse building in the very near future, according to Reverend Mother Camilla. Catherine McAuley Junior College is being planned physically with an eye to the future growth of the community and a concern for the fullest possible integration of the Teacher-Education Program for the Sisters of Mercy, Mother Camilla said.

Eskimo Mission School Planned

Montreal—(N.C.)—At Chesterfield, a mission settlement on the northwest coast of Hudson Bay, some 1,500 miles North of Montreal as the crow flies, a modern boarding school for Eskimo children will be erected.

The project of Bishop Marc Lacroix, O.M.I., Vicar Apostolic of Hudson Bay, entails considerable preparation and heavy expense for there is no wood in the sub-Arctic region where the school is to be built, and all materials must be transported from Montreal. Some 500 tons of material will be needed and transportation will cost about \$65 a ton.

The sermon will be preached by the Very Rev. John J. Forman, rector of the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, Albany. An alumnus of St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, Father Forman is diocesan director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine for the Diocese of Albany.
