**Deadline Nears For Korean
Veterans Under G. I. Bill**

Korean veterans released from military service on or before August 20, 1952 are fast approaching the deadline for enrolling for training.
Under the Korean G. I. bill, these veterans must begin training before August 21 of this year in order to continue afterward.
For many veterans, summer terms in school which begin in June will be their last chance to start G. I. training in time. If they wait until next fall's school terms, or some other time to begin, they will be too late.
ONCE A VETERAN has decided to train under the Korean G. I. Bill, he must choose the school and course he wants and be sure that the school will accept him for training. His next step is to file an application for Korean G. I. training with the Veterans Administration or with the school in which he wishes to enroll. He also may file at the Veterans' Information Service office in his community.
The VA will re-requests will provide him with vocational counseling in order to help him decide on an occupation suitable to his interests and needs. Since the above steps take some time, prompt action on the part of the veteran is especially necessary.
The August 20 deadline also applies to veterans planning to take apprentice, other job training and on-farm training.
Veterans separated after August 20, 1952 are not affected by the August cutoff date. They have two years from the date of their separation to begin G. I. training.
THE LAW REQUIRES that a veteran must enroll in and begin training on or before his deadline if he wants to go on with a stipend. The receipt of an application with the intention of starting later is not enough.
Korean veterans in school training are paid an allowance of \$130.00 if single, \$135.00 if they have one dependent, and \$160.00 a month if they have two or more dependents. This is paid directly to the veteran and he must pay the school for his tuition, books and supplies.
For apprentice and job training, the rate is \$70.00 to \$105.00 per month with reductions each four months as the veteran's training wages increase, and with a ceiling of \$310.00 per month on combined training allowance and wages.
