


Broadcast Set Sunday Of Mass

Catholic Hospital Leaders Urged To Care For Aged

Atlantic City, N. J. — (RNS) — The new president of the Catholic Hospital Association of the United States and Canada told delegates to its 39th annual convention here that they must reach into new medical mission fields of rehabilitating and caring for the aged and chronically ill.

Magr. Edmund J. Goebel, director of hospitals and superintendent of schools for the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, said "we must remember that Christ and His Church are not calling us to the exclusive field of general hospitals. The charity of hospital care must be as inclusive as the charity of Christ."

Magr. Goebel warned that as hospitals grow more complex the danger arises that they may become "buildings without souls" or just plain "medical factories."

The priest called for better public relations in hospital administration reminding the delegates that hospital people are servants and not persons to be served.

Holy Trinity Sodality Slates Marian Year Commemoration

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Urges Catholic Hospitals Maintain Their Atmosphere

Atlantic City, N. J. — (RNS) — Delegates to a hospital chaplains' conference here were told that non-Catholic patients in Catholic hospitals expect the atmosphere that is present in those hospitals.

Magr. Leo G. Fink, of Allentown, Pa., addressed the meeting held in conjunction with the 39th annual convention of the Catholic Hospital Association of the United States and Canada.

"WE NEED never compromise our position as Catholics and the Catholic atmosphere need never be suppressed or camouflaged," he said. "Non-Catholics expect us as Catholics to surround ourselves with a Catholic atmosphere."

They also anticipate a distinct Catholic code of ethics which will prohibit certain operations and practices which are oftentimes permitted in other institutions which are not Catholic. They expect us as chaplains to qualify as teachers of medical ethics, psychology and apologetics."

Magr. Fink, who is moderator of the Philadelphia Archdiocesan Hospital Association and director of Sacred Heart Hospital, Allentown, said that Catholic atmosphere "emanates from the Heart of Jesus Christ and is borne and transmuted into every department of our hospital."

He told the more than 50 chaplains present that the chapel should not be hidden away but made accessible to all. The priest added that statues, crucifixes, and the conservative erection of shrines also play a role in creating a Catholic atmosphere.

HE SAID THAT the chaplain should lend inspiration and leadership to hospital organizations and their activities as a means of developing a Catholic atmosphere.

Magr. Fink said it would be well for Catholic chaplains, in the Marian Year, to present the Virgin Mary to all patients, personnel and staff as the "incomparable and supreme comforter of the afflicted."
