Geneva—The Rev. Daniel W. Lynch, C.S.C., son of Mrs. Marguerite H. Lynch, and the late Willis D. Lynch of 22 Main St., Geneva, N. Y., will be ordained to the Holy Priesthood on June 5 at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, Washington, D. C., by Bishop John M. McManis, D.D., V.G.

Father Lynch will celebrate his first solemn Mass at St. Francis de Sales Church, Geneva, on Sunday, June 6, assisted by the Rev. Edward K. Ball, pastor of St. Francis' archdiocese, the Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, pastor of St. Stephen's parish as deacon, and the Rev. Thomas E. Laviton, C.S.C., of Fr. Baker High in Lakawanna, N. Y., as subdeacon. The Rev. John P. Lynch, C.S.C., an uncle of the newly ordained, will preach the sermon.

FATHER LYNCH attended St. Francis' Grammar School and High School in Geneva. He made his first religious vows at the Congregation of Holy Cross at Sacred Heart Novitiate, South Bend, Indiana in August of 1948. Completing his college courses at the University of Notre Dame, he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Philosophy in 1950, and then began his theological training at Holy Cross College, Washington, D. C.

A reception will be held at the home of Father Lynch's Mother on Sunday, June 6, from 4 to 6 P.M.

Fr. Hogan's Talk On Our Lady Highlights St. Mary's Meet

Auburn—The Rev. Joseph L. Hogan, M. A., S. T. D., principal of DeSales High School, Geneva, was the guest speaker at the annual banquet of the Rosary and Scapular Society of St. Mary's Church, Tuesday evening at Springside Inn.

Speaking on "Our Queen Assumed into Heaven," Father Hogan said in part: "On Nov. 1, 1950, 700,000 people gathered in St. Peter's Square in Rome to witness an historic occasion, the proclamation of the dogma of Our Blessed Mother's Assumption into Heaven. We pronounce, declare and define as a divinely revealed dogma that the Blessed Mother of God, Mary ever Virgin, having completed the course of her earthly life was assumed into Heaven.

"Outside the Catholic Church a storm of protest arose as people began to say, 'Here is a new doctrine for Catholics to believe. Too much honor is paid her by gullible Catholics.'

"THESE SAME people forgot the solid tradition of 20 centuries of history, assuring us that no place on earth claimed to possess her body; the world's most precious relic, that her feast had been celebrated solemnly as early as the 5th century.

"Why did the Church wait until 1950 to define this dogma? Perhaps it was the Holy Ghost guiding the Holy Father to lift our minds and hearts above the things of earth as we beheld Our Mother in Heaven in an age when the claims of our time make such demands on our time and attention.

"Perhaps too," Father Hogan continued, "in an age when sin is glorified and vice is considered the inevitable pastime of youth, our attention is focused anew on the Immaculate Mary, the model of purity we all need so much."

MISS MARY FALVEY, president, welcomed the members and guests and then introduced Miss Sylvia Antonacci, toastmaster. Miss Antonacci presented the outgoing president, Miss Falvey with a silver rosary.

Mrs. Patricia Gagan and Mrs. Anne Shaylor were vocal soloists. Group singing was led by Mrs. Frederick L. Keese, with Gerald F. Conroy as accompanist.

On behalf of the society, Miss Falvey presented the Rt. Rev. William E. Cowan, S.T.D., pastor with a check for the new St. Mary's School. Msgr. Cowan thanked the members for the gift and then thanked the officers.
