

# Benedictine Candidate Takes New Saint's Name

The Prior and Community of Mount Saviour monastery responded to the invitation of His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, to celebrate the historic event of the Canonization of Pope Pius X.

Benedictines are especially indebted to the Church's latest saint for his program of liturgical reform and for his apostolate for the active participation of the faithful in the celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, according to the monks.

"It was Pius X who, as Pope in the early years of this country, was responsible for the restoration of Gregorian Chant and the restoration of the Divine Office to their rightful place in the Church. It was also Pius X who gave to the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass the central position in Christian life which is its due."

"It was this newest of the Church's saints who insisted on the active role of the faithful in the offering of Holy Mass. His advice, that people should pray the Mass, not pray at the Mass, has since become the theme of the Liturgical Movement all over the world. He also encouraged active participation through his incessant efforts in promoting frequent reception of Holy Communion and the early admission of children to the Communion Table."

ONE OF THE candidates for the monastery, Brother John Godfredson, was admitted into the novitiate on Ascension Thursday.

New York — Several hundred former Elmira Reformatory inmates, their families and friends paid honor to the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Francis J. Lane at the eighth annual dinner of "Father Lane's Gang" Saturday night at the White Turkey Restaurant.

AMONG THE distinguished guests were Dr. Vincent Mazzola of New York, a member of the Reformatory's Board of Visitors, and Edward Mulrooney, a former New York City police Commissioner and New York State Commissioner of Corrections.

"Father Lane's Gang is a non-denominational organization composed of former Reformatory inmates who have banded together to help re-establish Reformatory parables."

Monsignor Lane is the Catholic chaplain at the Reformatory. Dr. Mazzola, principal speaker, paid high tribute to Monsignor Lane and said that "friendship, trust and charity are the seeds sown by Father Lane in the soil of cold suspicion, and the fruit born in 'Father Lane's Gang.'"

# Franciscan Lists First Solemn Mass In Elmira

The Rev. Justus John Bush of Elmira, a member of the Franciscan Order of Friars-Minor Conventual, will be ordained to the holy priesthood in Albany, on Saturday June 12. Father Justus will celebrate his first Solemn High Mass on Sunday morning, June 13 at 11 a.m. in the Church of Our Lady of Lourdes, Elmira.

A native of Elmira, Father Justus is the son of Mrs. Regina N. Bush of 33 Sunnyside Drive, Elmira, and the late Thomas J. Bush. He has twin sisters, Miss Katrina Bush who is at home, and Sister M. Campion of the Sisters of St. Joseph at the Nazareth Novitiate in Rochester.

The Sacrament of Holy Orders will be conferred on Father Justus by Bishop Edmund F. Gibbons Albany, at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Albany. His is the second Elmiran to be ordained a Franciscan, and the first from the Friars Minor Conventual. His pastor, the Rev. Leo G. Schwab of Our Lady of Lourdes Church, will be his sponsor at his ordination.

FATHER JUSTUS was born in May, 1925 and graduated from Holy Ave. School and Elmira Catholic High.

In 1944, he entered St. Francis Minor Seminary, Staten Island, New York, which is the preparatory seminary for the Eastern Province of the Order of Friars Minor Conventual, the Immaculate Conception Province.

He graduated from St. Francis Seminary in 1947 and entered the Franciscan Novitiate at St. Joseph's Friary in Cohoes, New York.

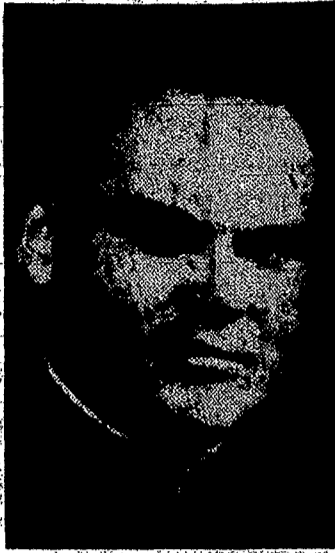
The Elmiran was given the religious name of Justus. He was born John Frederick. A year later, having completed his novitiate, Father Justus took simple temporary vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. He completed his two years of philosophy at Our Lady of Consolation Seminary in Carey, Ohio. He took his solemn vows in August 1951, after one year of theological studies at St. Anthony-on-Hudson, Rensselaer, the theological seminary of the Province. He continued the study of theology at St. Anthony-on-Hudson until the completion of his theological course this June.
