## State KC Meet Attracts 3000 To Rochester

New York State Knights of Columbus in their 58th annual convention in Rochester by resolution warned that the Communist action in Indo-China and the Malayan peninsula was "pursuant to the Russian plan of conquest." Sessions were held in Seneca Hotel.

More than 3,000 persons attended the convention including 54 delegates from the Empire State jurisdiction. State membership chairman Fred Harrison of the Bronx reported 97,636 members of the K. of C. in New York State, an increase of 11 per cent over last year's total.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney presided at the opening Solemn Pontifical Mass in St. Joseph's Church, received state officers and delegates at his Episcopal residence on East Ave. and spoke at the closing banquet in the Seneca.

John J. Kinney of Rochester, convention chairman, was elected one of eight delegates to the Supreme Convention in Louisville, Ky.

**BENIS A. MANSFIELD** of Saratoga Springs was re-elected State Deputy.

Also chosen to serve for another year were: John F. Symonds, of Manlius, State Secretary; James G. Cunningham, of Springfield Gardens, Long Island, State Treasurer; Roland A. Crowe of Glen Cove, Long Island, State Advocate; Joseph V. Colaso of Manhattan, State Warden.

The resolution on Indo-China said: "In every country or section coming under the control of Red China we have seen Christianity—and all religions—persecuted. Ministers, priests, and all religions have been subjected to all types of cruel punishments, and nearly all of them, driven from these areas."

**COMMUNIST RUSSIA** and its Red Satellites are endeavoring to obtain recognition of Red China by the United Nations and the United States, the resolution continued, and it was declared that the Convention "opposes every action that would in any way permit Red China to be admitted to the United Nations and that we condemn the persecution by the Red China Government of all priests, ministers, and religions."

Catholics were challenged by State Deputy Mansfield in his address at the Convention Banquet Saturday evening at the Hotel Seneca, to "vigorous, sincere, and courageous application of Catholic precept and example to the civic, social, and economic life of their respective communities."

"Our patriotism," he said "must be a shield for the protection of the inalienable rights of man to reach full stature through conscientious endeavor and to achieve true dignity in a government created for him, and to him."

## Franciscan Lists First Solemn Mass In Elmira

The Rev. Justus John Bush of Elmira, a member of the Franciscan Order of Friars Minor Conventual, will be ordained to the holy priesthood in Albany, on Saturday June 12. Father Justus will celebrate his first Solemn High Mass on Sunday morning June 13 at 11 a.m. in the Church of Our Lady of Lourdes, Elmira.

A native of Elmira, Father Justus is the son of Mrs. Regina N. Bush of 33 Sunnyside Drive, Elmira, and the late Thomas J. Bush. He has two sisters, Miss Katrina Bush who is at home, and Sister M. Camille of the Sisters of St. Joseph at the Nazareth Novitiate in Rochester.

The Sacrament of Holy Orders will be conferred on Father Justus by Bishop Edmund F. Gibbons Albany, at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Albany. His is the second Elmiran to be ordained a Franciscan, and the first from the Friars Minor Conventual. His pastor, the Rev. Leo G. Schwab of Our Lady of Lourdes Church, will be his sponsor at his ordination.

**FATHER JUSTUS** was born in May, 1925 and graduated from Hendy Ave. School and Elmira Catholic High.

In 1944, he entered St. Francis Minor Seminary, Staten Island, New York, which is the preparatory seminary for the Eastern Province of the Order of Friars Minor Conventual, the Immaculate Conception Province.

He graduated from St. Francis Seminary in 1947 and entered the Franciscan Novitiate at St. Joseph's Friary in Cohoes, New York.

The Elmiran was given the religious name of Justus. He was born John Frederick. A year later, having completed his novitiate, Father Justus took simple temporary vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. He completed his two years of philosophy at Our Lady of Consolation Seminary in Carey, Ohio. He took his solemn vows in August 1951, after one year of theological studies at St. Anthony-on-Hudson, Rensselaer, the theological seminary of the Province. He continued the study of theology at St. Anthony-on-Hudson until the completion of his theological course this June.

At Father Justus' first Solemn High Mass Sunday, June 13 at Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Elmira, at 11 a.m., Father Justus will celebrate his first Solemn Benediction at Our Lady of Lourdes Church.
