Nora Shirley Serves As Queen In May Day Rites

Hornell—May devotional ceremonies, a manifestation of the selection of the Blessed Virgin Mary as Queen of the Universe, were held Friday night in St. Ann's Church.

The traditional exercises were carried out by more than 70 students of St. Ann's School. Most of them were pupils of St. Ann's music department, directed by the Sisters of Mercy.

NORA SHIRLEY, a ninth grade student, was "Queen" and her attendants were selected for fidelity, loyalty and other outstanding character traits.

Another ninth grade student, Josephine Antonelli, was maid of honor. Attendees were Nancy O'Donnell, eighth grade, and Sue Phillips, seventh grade.

Little Joan Striani was crown bearer; David Hebbie and Robert Candelero, first graders, were train bearers.

The "Queen" was garbed in white with a long illusion veil which fell from a crown of white and blue carnations. Each member of her "court" wore white and blue in observance of the Marian Year. White and blue are traditional colors of the Blessed Virgin.

A FLORAL CROWN of white and blue carnations was placed on the head of the large statue of Our Lady of Fatima by the student "Queen" while the entourage was grouped about the shrine which has held a place of honor in the church during the month of May which is dedicated to the Blessed Virgin.

Girls of the sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth grades formed a living Rosary near the shrine, and the main altar of the church. The girls in pastel party dresses formed the "Hall Mary's" while red and white-robed choir boys bearing lighted candles, represented the Lord's Prayers and Gloria Patri's between the mystic tiers.

The girls wore head scarfs of white, blue, red, yellow and green, symbols of the world, Europe, whose spiritual capital is Rome and whose White Shepherd is Pope Pius XII; the blue, the islands of the Pacific and Australia; the red, America, first settled by the redman; yellow, Asia, morning light of the east; and green, symbolizing the missions of Africa.

THE WORLD ROSARY theme was carried out in floral decorations at Our Lady of Fatima shrine.

Ceremonies closed with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. The Rev. Lawrence W. Gannon, pastor, celebrated Benediction. In the sanctuary were the Rev. Robert MacNamara and the Rev. Leo Mans.

Music for the Benediction and the crowning ceremonies was by the student group, under direction of the Sisters of Mercy with Miss Madeline Brohm. They sang the traditional Lourdes Hymn, "Hail Holy Queen" (Entronced Above), "Hail Virgin, Dearest Mary" and for a recessional, "Holy God We Praise Thy Name."
