## Father Brennan Marks Jubilee At Solemn High Mass

Corning—The Rev. Thomas F. Brennan, pastor of St. Mary's Church, celebrated the 25th anniversary of his ordination at a Solemn High Mass in his church last Sunday at 11:15 a.m.

Officers of the Mass included the pastor's brother, the Rev. Robert Brennan, deacon; and the Rev. L. W. Sansom, assistant pastor of his church, as sub-deacon. The Rev. A. J. Horr, also a St. Mary's assistant pastor, the sermon.

A native of Rochester, Father Brennan has been pastor since 1953, coming from St. Patrick's Church, Mount Morris, where he was appointed pastor in 1948. Father Brennan attended St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries and did graduate work at St. Bonaventure University, St. John's University and Niagara University.

His first appointment was to St. Augustine's Church, Rochester, as assistant pastor. He then taught on the faculty of St. Andrew's Seminary for 17 years, from 1931 to 1948. Father Brennan is 49 years old.

## Cassidy Promoted By Glass Works
