"Your motives in carrying out your nursing career must be pitched on a much higher level than material gain. Nursing has a strong element of the supernatural, therefore you must keep close to the source of supernatural power. Almighty God," he continued.

"The spiritual aspect of your service to your fellow man prompts the prayers of all who wish you well. It is fitting that you embark on a profession which so requires the protection of Almighty God in the House of God."

"Keep close to God," the Bishop concluded. "If you sincerely seek His divine help, you will find the hand of God with you in your trials and difficulties and finally guide you into His Presence for all eternity."

Father Gibbons Addresses First Saturday Luncheon

Hornell — Importance of the Blessed Virgin Mary as a messenger of God was stressed by the Rev. Paul Gibbons, a member of the faculty of St. Andrews Seminary, Rochester, and former assistant pastor of St. Ann's, Hornell, in his talk to 98 women at a First Saturday Luncheon in the Moose Home.

Father Gibbons used as an illustration the appearance of the Blessed Virgin to two peasant children at LaSalette, France, in 1846.

"The Blessed Virgin told the children she wished them to deliver a message to their people. She wanted them to realize that they were invoking the wrath of God by their sinful ways."

SPEAKING IN the native language of the youngsters, she said she cannot withhold the arm of St. Ann's anger and then warned the people to repent lest a famine would sweep the French countryside.

The children returned with the message and despite threats and bribes refused to deny what they had seen and heard. The truth of their account was evident in the near future. The famine foretold by the Blessed Virgin descended upon France," Father Gibbons said.

Approval of the Church was granted the miraculous apparition after thorough investigation by Pope Pius IX. Father Gibbons explained. A basilica was erected at the site and an order of priests founded in honor of Our Lady of LaSalette. The first shrine where the apparition took place became filled with water possessing miraculous healing properties.

"The Blessed Mother's interest in the spiritual welfare of every one of her children can be illustrated by the story of the mother of 12 who, when asked which child she loved most, replied: "The one who is away until he comes home and the one who is sick until he recovers," the priest concluded.
