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**Doctor Sees No Place In Medicine For Atheists**  
Philadelphia — (RNS) — There is no place in medicine for the atheist or the materialist, the president of the American Medical Association said in an address here.  
Dr. Edward J. McCormick of Rochester, N.Y., said medicine is a precisely calling and its followers must have the regard for the soul as well as the body.  
His address was read to the graduating class of Hahnemann Medical College by Dr. John Conlin, president of the Massachusetts Medical Society. Dr. McCormick was prevented by illness from attending.  
The AMA head said medicine has "bad public relations" because "our system of medical education allows no time for the study of morals, ethics and philosophy."  
"The oath of Hippocrates and the Code of Medical Ethics are based upon the Ten Commandments, he continued, "but they can mean little or nothing to those with only skilled scientific training and no knowledge of the existence of a Supreme Being in whose image and likeness man has been created."  
"MEDICAL EDUCATORS must finally conclude that if we are to be a profession above suspicion, we must graduate men and women with a deep conception of moral fundamentals, and who recognize their obligations to humanity and to their fellow practitioners."  
"There is no substitute for honesty and integrity. We can not substitute harsh realism for idealism. If you have not so resolved, you who are about to become physicians should seek some other avenue of work."

him a domestic priest with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor.  
**FATHER MUCKLE**, founder and organizer of St. Thomas Church, Irondequoit, was appointed to that post in 1922. He purchased the property now owned by the parish on which he constructed the beautiful combination St. Thomas Church and School. He expanded the school beginning in 1945.  
He also purchased a fine brick residence as a parish convent and renovated and enlarged the original house purchased with the property into a spacious rectory. Of his 44 years in the church's service, he has spent 25 at St. Thomas, where he has succeeded in keeping the parish entirely free from debt or at a reasonably conservative figure.  
He is the eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Muckle of Stanley and has three brothers who are priests and a sister who is in the Sisters of Mercy. His priest-brothers are: the Rev. Charles E. of Avon; the Rev. Joseph T., a Basilian Father and the Rev. William both of Toronto. One of his sisters is Sister Mary Charles

Father John Muckle was educated in Yates County public schools and Danville High School from which he was graduated in 1899. Keuka College, St. Hyacinth College, Quebec; St. Michael's College, Toronto; St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries.  
Ordained in 1906, Father John Muckle was appointed procurator of St. Bernard's Seminary. In that position he was also superintendent of the Seminary farms in Greece and the Seminary farm and vineyard now owned by the Society of the Divine Word at Conesus, N.Y.  
He served as assistant pastor of Holy Rosary Church, Rochester, and in 1915 was named assistant at St. Francis DeSales Church, Geneva where he was also principal of DeSales High School.

**FATHER WOOD** has been pastor of the Church of the Assumption, Fairport since 1925, a period of 23 years.  
Born May 30, 1887 in Mansfield, the son of Charles Wood and Anna Hall Wood, he attended Caladonia High School and went to St. Charles College, Catoctinville, Md. Before entering St. Bernard's Seminary.  
He was ordained on June 6, 1914 and his first assignment was as assistant pastor of Corpus Christi Church, Rochester where he served four years. In 1918 and 1919 he was Catholic Chap-

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**Homeless Girls Center Erected**  
Montreal — (NC) — Long-time dream of religious authorities in Montreal, the Maria Goretti Center, a six-story modern building for homeless girls, is nearing completion. Already 225 rooms are available for girls without homes working in this city. There also will be quarters for girls who are unemployed and without resources. When completed the Center will have accommodations for 600 girls.  
Besides living quarters, the building will include a chapel, study rooms, music room, reading and recreation rooms, snack bar and similar facilities. Among the recreational features will be four bowling alleys.

**Red Prober Loses Tilt With Jailed Missioner**  
Hong Kong — (NC) — A Chinese Communist interrogator dropped his jaw in astonishment when he tangled with a Catholic priest in Shanghai prison. He also dropped the questioning.  
"The questioner had tried for many hours to get the priest to admit some crime. 'What crime did you commit? Why are you here in jail?' the Red official asked in an effort to make the priest indulge in a bit of Communist 'self-accusation.'  
THE MISSIONARY countered calmly by stating that these were exactly the questions he would like to ask. He had committed no crime. He did not know why he was jailed.  
To get material for accusations the interrogator ordered the priest to write an account of the mission in his province and his relations to his religious training. The priest said he would be glad to comply and asked for 400 sheets of paper.  
"Four hundred sheets?" the Red official said in amazement. "Yes, that's just for the introduction," the priest replied. And the questioning ended, that day."  
THE MISSIONARY was released here by a fellow prisoner just expelled from Red China. He is Father Florentino Garcia, Spanish Augustinian and the last member of his order on the Red mainland. He did not give the prisoner's name or nationality for fear of reprisal on him.  
Father Garcia stated that the Red interrogator evidently got no material for charges against the priest after reading his voluminous writings.

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**Dominicans Win War Claims Award**  
Washington, D. C. — (NC) — The War Claims Commission has awarded 253,472.75 pesos (\$126,736.37) to the Philippine Corporation of Padres Dominicos for real and personal property damage in Baguio as a result of World War II.  
The Dominican Fathers claim previously had been disallowed by the Claims Adjudication Section of the Commission on the ground that the applicant had failed to show affiliation with a religious organization in the United States. The religious order then appealed to the full Commission which reversed the original ruling after finding that the group satisfied the affiliation requirement.

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
