Mount Savior Monks To Mark St. Benedict's Feast

Benedictine monks of Mount Saviour Monastery, Madison Road, off Henry Hollow, Big Flats, near Elmira, will celebrate the feast known as the Solemnity of Saint Benedict on Sunday, July 11. This is the second feast of the great founder of the Benedictines, the first occurring on March 21.

For the Solemnity of St. Benedict, the relics of the saint will be exposed for the veneration of the faithful in the monastery chapel from Vespers at 4 p.m. Saturday, July 10, through Vespers and Benediction at 4 p.m. Sunday. High Mass on Sunday at 9 a.m. will be celebrated by the Very Rev. Darnassus Winzen, prior, who will also preach. The public is welcome to attend this, and all other services at the monastery.

ST. BENEDICT, known as the Patriarch of the Monks of the West, was born in 480. He founded the famous monastery of Monte Cassino in 529 and after writing his famous Rule died there in 547. His influence through the Benedictine Rule and the monasteries which observed it, had an enormous influence on the conversion of Europe to the Faith, on the civilization and education of the people, on the development of agriculture, architecture and the arts. The Benedictines spread rapidly and for some time were the only religious order in the Western Church. The 7th to the 12th centuries are known as "the Benedictine Centuries," so great was the influence of St. Benedict's monks in the life of the Church and also of the nations in which they were established.

The Order passed through one of the most terrible moments of its history when, during the French Revolution and Napoleonic Wars it was almost wiped out. A remarkable revival began in 1835, which has continued to the present day, and has seen the Order grow from a remnant of a few hundred monks to about 11,000. The Benedictines first came to the United States in 1846, and now number about 2,400 in this country.

MONTE SAVIOUR, one of the youngest of all Benedictine monasteries, was founded three years ago and has in that time grown from a membership of five to 22. It is the only Benedictine monastery in New York State.

Despite the influence of the Benedictines in missionary work, in scholarship, in agriculture and the arts, the life of the monks is devoted primarily to prayer, especially the Church's liturgical prayer, to which are devoted about five hours each day, and to the labor which is necessary for the maintenance of the monastery, the farm work, house work, repairing, building, cooking and cleaning and many other everyday chores.


