New Book Printed On Social Order Available Here

A new book, "Spotlight on Social Order," by the Rev. William J. Smith, S.J., director of St. Peter's College, Institute of Industrial Relations, Jersey City, N. J., has just come off the presses of Christopher Press, Inc., Rochester.

The book treats of the reconstruction of the social order as indicated in the Papal pronouncements of Leo XIII, Pius XI and Pius XII. The volume is a response to a growing demand from many people in all walks of life. It is based on two series of articles previously published and widely read. These articles have since been re-written, amplified and brought up to date.

CONTENTS ARE in four parts covering these headings: "Realism of Rerum Novarum," "Modern Materialistic Capitalism," "Common Sense Christian Idealism," and "Modern Echo of an Age-Old Challenge."

The author, Father Smith, spent 17 years in Catholic Social Action work in Brooklyn diocese prior to taking on the directorship of the New Jersey Institute in 1952. The book carries the imprimatur of Archbishop-Bishop Thomas E. Molloy of Brooklyn.

Action of individual parents and civic groups in discouraging the sale of lurid comic books and obscene magazines to minors was urged in a report to Police Chief William A. Winfield, made by Police Captain Henry H. Jensen of the Youth Bureau.

"Outstanding vigilance" on the part of parents and such groups as parent-teacher associations "must be encouraged," Captain Jensen said in his report.

The youth bureau director said that 80 per cent of the comic books offered for sale are "packed with every form of vice, sadism and violence. In many cases of child molesters, we can trace the influence of these so-called comic books as the main idea of the child's difficulties."
