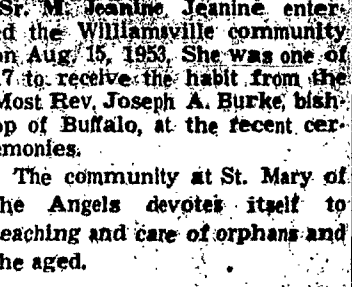
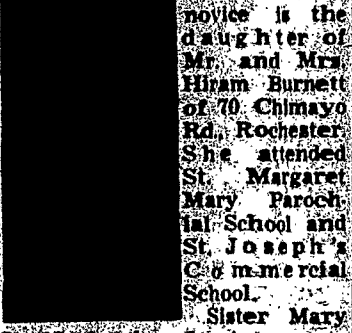
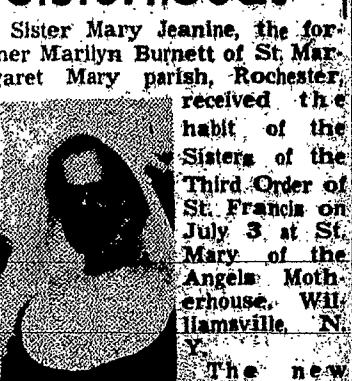

Rochester Girls Received, Professed In Sisterhoods

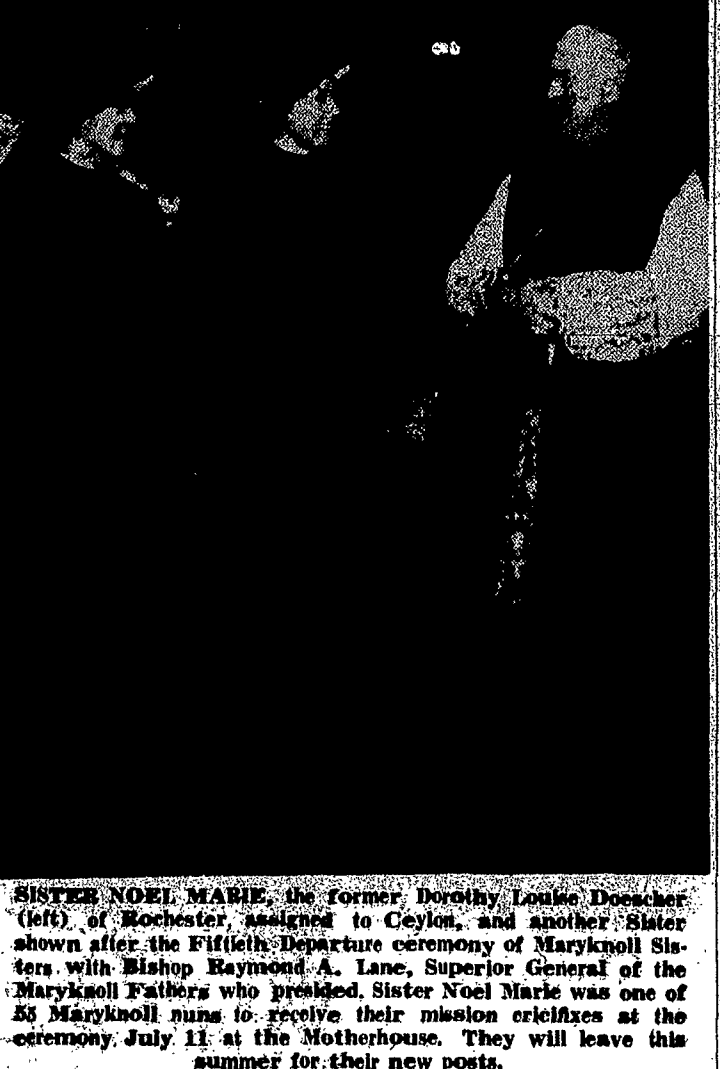

Children In Church (Cont)

It has been well said that a well behaved youngster is not something that just happens like blue eyes and curly hair. It is a result of a process of growth in which the parent works steadily and patiently with the child, adjusting the teaching process to the emotional and intellectual needs of the child.

Since we discussed in last week's column the question of the small child in church, the preceding observation seems particularly apt. Taking the small child to church has become a problem for many young parents because of the decentralization of housing with its consequent distances from church and from the relatives for neighbors with whom the parents of generation ago used to check the pre-school children on the way to church.

Most interested authorities agree that a small child should be taken to church first for short visits at a time when there are not many in the church. It is further suggested that he be shown around the church and given whispered explanations of what he sees. If the mother is very quiet, the child will imitate her.

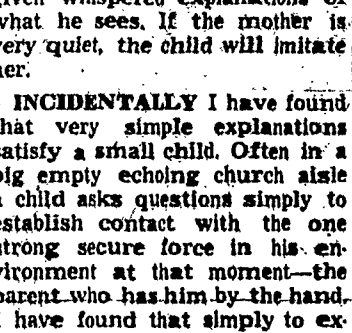
INCIDENTALLY I have found that very simple explanations satisfy a small child. Often in a big empty echoing church aisle a child asks questions simply to establish contact with the one strong secure figure in his environment at that moment—the parent who has him by the hand. I have found that simply to explain the Stations of the Cross as pictures of "How Our Lord Died for Us" will satisfy him and give meaning to the pictures when his wandering attention is caught by the representations on future visits.

Children enjoy a visit to the altars of the Sacred Heart, the Blessed Mother and St. Joseph because they recognize them from stories and books at home. I generally dismiss with a silent prayer of apology to the heavenly personage involved—all other pictures and statues as "Friends of Our Lord." After all, that is a very high compliment to pay them.

WHEN THE CHILD is, in the opinion of the parent, ready to attend services, he may be taken to church and to a front pew. All authorities agree that he should be where he can see what is going on.

It has been my personal observation that children actually behave better when they are more or less hemmed in. If I take a three year old and sit alone with him or her in a front pew, there is a very great temptation for the child either to slide along the polished pew seat, while maintaining a seated position, or to walk precariously on the kneeler. That I would class as disturbing to others in the church because anyone who can see the child shares the fear that he will fall.

I HAVE FOUND that a child wiggles less if he is sitting between two adults or between an adult and an older child; but here again a parent must discover what is best for his own child. I have noticed that many parents put their children on the aisle seat. I think this is a help when the child is seated farther back from the altar, because he can stick his little head around the edge of the pew and see the altar.
