Excavating machinery formed the background for the outdoor ceremony. It belongs to the local firm of Smith, Langhans & McLaughlin, which has the contract for the \$319,800 project.

Architects are Joseph P. Flynn and Herbert H. Bonacker of Rochester.

It was on July 20, 1913, that the Rev. James B. Bustin, then pastor of St. Mary's Church, announced the decision of the Rt. Rev. Thomas Hickey, then bishop of the Diocese of Rochester, to establish St. Vincent de Paul's Parish.

Father Bustin also announced that the Rev. John A. Conway, who had spent seven years as the first Catholic chaplain at Elmira Reformatory, would be pastor of the new parish. Now the Rt. Rev. Mgr. John A. Conway, the former Reformatory chaplain is pastor of Holy Family Church in Auburn and dean of Cayuga County. He celebrated his 50th anniversary in the priesthood this month.

BISHOP HICKEY laid the cornerstone for the present building, housing church and school, Nov. 13, 1913, and dedicated the structure March 29, 1914.

When the new church has been completed, the present building will become St. Vincent's Parochial School.

The new church will have a seating capacity of 600 which will handle the present needs of the parish. It was also estimated that the new facilities will be adequate to meet the needs of the parish for sometime in the future.

Superior Named For Filippini Teachers

Mother Ninetta Tonata, provincial and founder of the American Province of St. Eusebio Filippini at Morristown, N. J., was elected Superior General of the Religious Teachers Filippini at their general chapter meeting in Rome according to Religious News Service.

The Religious Teachers Filippini have a foundation in St. Mary's of the Lake Parish, Watkins Glen in the Diocese of Rochester.

MOTHER NINETTA, 65, a native of Gugliese-Abbruzzi, Italy, was sent by the newly organized St. Eusebio to found the American province in 1910. She established her first convent at St. Joachim's parish in Trenton, N.J., where the first mother-house, Villa Victoria, was bought for the order by the late Archbishop Thomas J. Walsh of Newark, N.J. In 1930, the mother-house was transferred to Villa Walsh in Morristown.

Retiring Superior General, Mother Teresa Sacucci, also comes from the Morristown foundation. Like Mother Ninetta, she had served a term of 15 years as American provincial before heading the order in Rome.

The Religious Teachers Filippini were founded in Italy in 1692 by St. Lucy Filippini (1672-1732) and Rosa Verini of Montefascone. The American province has more than 500 members engaged in teaching and missionary work.

They are also to be found in the archdioceses of Baltimore, Hartford, Newark, New York and Philadelphia and the dioceses of Albany, Bridgeport, Brooklyn, Camden, Cleveland, Norwich, Ogdensburg, Paterson, Pittsburgh, Providence, Saratoga and Trenton.

Annual Blessing Of Automobiles Set For Sunday
