

Monsignor Lane Honored By 'Release', American Prison Chaplains Magazine

University Planned
Windsor, Ont. (NC) — Father E. C. LeBel, president of Assumption College here, has announced that he has made application to the Ontario Legislature for the creation of the University of Windsor.

Rt. Rev. Msgr. Francis J. Lane, chaplain at Elmira Reformatory, was honored by the quarterly magazine of the American Prison Chaplains Association, "Release".

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Following is the article in its entirety:
"Father Lane, the Roman Catholic chaplain at Elmira Reformatory, Elmira, N.Y., can speak with wisdom and authority concerning the work of chaplains in penal and correctional institutions. His opinions are the result of thirty-two years of experience as chaplain at the Elmira Reformatory."

"He is an inspiration for all of us in the chaplaincy, showing us that with years on the job one can speak with conviction and assurance as to what is the right way to proceed."
"His work shows us the importance of permanency of office and the value that we can contribute to our work by dedicating our lives to the work of being spiritual leaders and counselors in penal and correctional institutions. His spiritual superiors have honored him because of his devotion and zeal for his office by conferring upon him the highest honor the Church gives to a priest, when they raised him to a Domestic Prelate with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor. But all who know him and come into contact with him call him 'Father'. He possesses humility, which is always the quality of a leader and a gentleman."

"The Saturday Evening Post, in its October 18, 1953 issue, devoted a lengthy article to Father Lane's work at Elmira, and his influence as felt in the Metropolitan area of New York City."
"THIS ARTICLE brings out clearly the qualities so necessary in the work of chaplains in penal and correctional institutions, and the qualities mentioned above, that are possessed in full measure by Father Lane."

"We chaplains are grateful for the example of men like Father Lane and other chaplains of his type. These men have pioneered in this work. They have laid a foundation upon which we can build the philosophy that will help us to increase acceptance and understanding on the part of administration of our walled cities." By following through and helping with what they have begun, we will lead society to the understanding it must have of the man who has studied against society and who, after satisfying his debt, plunges once more in its midst. We will find ourselves influencing the state to accept not only its obligations towards inmates, but also the fact that it has an opportunity to develop from among them good citizens who will accept their place in society.

"Most important of all is the truth, Father Lane and others of his type have made clear in their spiritual programs — man's dependence upon God. Our work as chaplains will accomplish much if we remember to give God proper recognition. 'Pau' planted, Apollo watered, and God gives the increase.' 1 Corinthians 3:6."

Mother Ninetta, Pioneer In Teaching Order In U. S.

Reverend Mother Ninetta Ionata, M.B.T., Provincial of the American Province who was elected Reverend Mother General in Rome at the General Chapter of Religious Teachers in the province of Campobasso, Abruzzi, Italy on Nov. 7, 1887.

Her training, both in character and in education, was undertaken by her parents together with her two aunts and uncle who were professionals in the field of education.

Sister's call to the religious life was answered on May 7, 1890, when accompanied by her father, Antonio Ionata, to Rome, she entered the Motherhouse of the Pontifical Institute. Within a few days she knew all the Sisters, both young and old.

"FOLLOWING IS the account of this pioneer Sister's career as prepared at Villa Walsh in Morristown, N. J.:"
"The Sisters were charmed by the candid simplicity and willing helpfulness of the new postulant especially towards the aged which won for her the title of the good angel of the Novitiate. On December 8, 1898, she cast aside her worldly garb, donned the religious habit and made her profession."

"Her exceptional qualities were so pronounced that the Reverend Mother General, Rosa Leon, sent her and four other Sisters on August 4, 1910, as pioneers to fulfill the mandate of His Holiness Pope Pius X to open the school in Saint Joachim's Parish, Trenton, New Jersey, and to found the Institute in the United States of America."

"UNDER THE valorous leadership and exemplary guidance of Mother Ninetta and amidst the greatest sacrifices and trials, the small community continued with steadfast determination to carry out successfully its work of establishing the foundation."
"God, blessing the tireless efforts, saw fit to reward them by sending the Most Reverend Thomas J. Walsh, as Bishop of

Blessing of automobiles will take place this Sunday, July 25, feast of St. Christopher, patron of travellers, in the new parking area opposite Annunciation Church on Norton St., according to the Rev. Albert L. Simonetti pastor.

Ceremonies will begin at 1 p.m. in the new blacktop parking lot, which extends over a 100x200 foot area. There are four entrances into the lot, two on Norton St. and two on Baleskese St. ST. CHRISTOPHER has long been invoked as a protector of travellers and the practice of wearing a St. Christopher medal on one's person or in an automobile is widespread. These medals will be available at the blessing ceremonies.

A third-century saint of Asia Minor, legend has it that St. Christopher was engaged in carrying people across a raging stream. One day he carried the Christ Child across, his burden becoming heavier at each step until it was almost unbearable, for Christ bore in his hands the weight of the world.

To prove his identity Christ caused Christopher's staff to grow into a fruit-bearing tree, the scene usually depicted on St. Christopher medals. This miracle converted many, but excited the rage of the king, who ordered Christopher to be imprisoned, tortured and beheaded.
