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

When Genevieve de Galard-Terrsube slighted from the plane that brought her to America at the invitation of President Eisenhower and Congress, it was observed that she was wearing a small gold medallion. On its face was the image of St. Genevieve, patron saint of the nurse and patroness of the City of Paris where the nurse was born.

There is a parallel between the bravery of Miss de Galard and the saint. The nurse showed courage as the lone wornan caring for the wounded French garrison under Red seige. Saint Genevieve rallied Parisians in the fifth century when Attila's Hun army threatened the city and her inspiration gave them assurance that the attack could be repelled.

The 29-year-old nurse was the only woman in the besieged! Indo-Chinese fortress at the time of its fall. She was released shortly faterwards by her Red captors and later returned to

RECENTLY ASKED by an editor of La Croix, Paris Catholic daily, for a statement on the influence of the Faith among the dying troops at Dien Bien Phu, Miss de Galard replied that she could speak only for herself. For her, she said, the influence of the Faith was dominant. She added that a large number of dying at the fortress had asked that their mothers be informed that they had died with a peaceful conscience. In her last letter to her moth
