Manila Archbishop Lauds New Regime In Philippines

Despite the nearness of the Philippines to China and other Communist countries, Archbishop Rufino Santos of the Archdiocese of Manila on a visit to Rochester this week voiced strong faith in the leadership of President Ramon Magaysay, Nationalist Democratic leader of the Republic.

"Our six years of democratic independence have brought us some satisfaction in home rule. These beginnings were slow and difficult, but we have learned much," the prelate said.

Popular confidence in President Magaysay was shown in his election by a tremendous majority, the Archbishop said. "He has a great heart for the people and he is for the people in every way."

"The greatest comfort and courage the Filipinos have," he continued, "is their Catholic faith and their devotion to the Blessed Mother." The Catholic character of 90% of the population is a major barrier to Communism, he claimed.

The 400-year-old history of Our Lady's influence in the islands is shown by the nightly radio-rosary program from Manila which reaches every island and almost every city of the archipelago in a modern approach toward unifying the people in prayer.

THE GRACIOUS, young Archbishop is returning to the Philippines from Rome and other parts of Europe where he viewed the canonization rites last month. In the Archbishop's party are three Filipino priests and two

the Japanese Army sentenced him to 15 years at hard labor for assisting the Americans and for refusing to "frame" the Archbishop in military crimes.

On Aug. 25, 1947 the Manila Prelate was named Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Manila by Pope Pius XII and on Oct. 24 of that year he was consecrated.

He was made Apostolic Administrator of the Lipa diocese on Jan. 20, 1950 and the following Sept. was named Apostolic Administrator of the Pangasinan diocese and Apostolic Prelate of Infanta.

IN A RADIO broadcast here on the Courier-Journal's radio program over WHAM in November, 1950, the Bishop discussed Catholic action in the Philippines and the slow work of rebuilding war-damaged churches and schools. He told the diocesan listening audience that American generosity was the chief factor in the Church's reconstruction. Six Maryknoll nuns returned to Lipa with him to open a new girls' academy for the diocese.

At that time the Bishop stated that Communism was losing its hold in the Philippines as the people find employment, housing and financial aid from the new government.

UPON THE DEATH of Archbishop Gabriel M. Reyes on Oct. 14, 1952, the Manila Prelate was named Apostolic Administrator of the Archdiocese of Manila. In December of that year he was appointed Archbishop of Manila and he was installed on March 25, 1953.

Archbishop Santos expressed appreciation to the many people who have made his brief stay in the U.S. so enjoyable.

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How To Make Marian Year Pilgrimage

"How can I make a Marian year pilgrimage—I have neither the time nor the money for a long trip?" No doubt many of us have asked this question during the past few months. But all of us can and should make pilgrimages during this Marian year.

A Marian year pilgrimage need not be an expensive nor a time-consuming venture. Most of us are within walking distance of a church where a plenary indulgence may be gained. A plenary

conditions may be met as follows:

Rochester—Church of the Annunciation, Holy Rosary, Immaculate Conception, Our Lady of Good Counsel, Our Lady of Lourdes, Our Lady of Mount Carmel, Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Our Lady of Victory, Our Mother of Sorrows, St. Mary, and Star of the Sea Chapel.

Auburn—St. Mary; Bath, St. Mary; Brockport, Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary; Bunnells, St. Mary; Canandaigua, St. Mary; Corning, St. Mary; Danville, St. Mary.

Elmira—Our Lady of Lourdes, St. Mary; Fairport, Assumption; Genesee, St. Mary; Honeyey, St. Mary; Horseheads, St. Mary; Ilaca, Immaculate Conception; King Ferry, Our Lady of the Lake; Mt. Morris, Assumption.

Ontario—St. Mary of the Lake; Painted Post, Immaculate Heart of Mary; Rexville, St. Mary; Rushville, St. Mary; Scottsville, St. Mary of the Assumption; Waterloo, St. Mary; Watkins Glen, St. Mary of the Lake.



indulgence may be gained under the following conditions:

1. UPON FULFILLMENT of Confession, Communion, and prayer for the Pope's intentions as often as a pilgrimage is made in a group to any of the churches listed below on any Saturday of the Marian year.

2. After confessions and Communion, as often as they visit these same churches and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father on certain feast days—August 15 (Assumption), September 8 (Nativity of the B.V.M.), September 15 (Seven Dolours), and December 8, the closing day of the Marian year.

3. After Confession, Communion, and prayer for the Pope's intentions to any person who devoutly attends any sacred ceremony celebrated in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary. If they attend with only a contrite heart (without Confession and Communion) they can gain an indulgence of ten years.

4. AT ANY UNUSUAL shrine where the Blessed Virgin is given singular veneration and which generally attracts large and distant pilgrimages this spiritual favor is granted in addition to those mentioned above. The faithful may gain a plenary indulgence not only on Saturdays, but also on all other days of the Marian year provided that they have gone to Confession and Communion and devoutly visit the shrine and pray for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff.

Two churches in Rochester are included in this category—St. Joseph's and St. Francis of Assisi. St. Joseph's Church is considered in this category because of the special devotion to Our Lady of Perpetual Help, and St. Francis of Assisi Church because of the Family Radio Rosary for Peace.

CONFESION may be fulfilled on the day itself or eight days previous or eight days after the visit in any of the above cases. Communion may be received on the day of the visit, or the day before, or eight days after the visit. One Confession and one Communion is sufficient to gain many indulgences. St. Louis Parish Plans New Church, School

Architects' plans for a new St. Louis school and church in Pittsford were released for the first time this week by the pastor, the Rev. John A. Reddington. The first section of a general plan to meet the greatly expanding needs of the Pittsford area brought enthusiastic response from those present according to word received.

"It is our hope," declared Father Reddington, in reviewing the sketches, "to blend the finest of modern church architecture with the beautiful colonial surroundings of Pittsford, building a parish center in which both Catholic and non-Catholic may take pride. We hope to make St. Louis a model suburban parish."

THE PLANS were submitted by J. Sanford Shanley of New York City, an architect experienced in church and educational fields. Associated with him in the project is Alan Dalley, a Rochester architect living in the St. Louis parish.

In conjunction with the initial presentation of the plans by the pastor Father Reddington and as-

stant pastor, the Rev. James L. Callan, the appointment of Robert E. Ginna, executive vice president of the Rochester Gas & Elec. Co., who led to such success the recent Bishop's High School drive, was announced as general chairman of the forthcoming fundraising program.

Plans for the drive—scheduled for this Fall, will, according to Mr. Ginna, be announced in detail in the early future.

Benefit Garden Tea Slated in Mt. Morris




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
