AMONG WOMEN
Devotion To Mary

As we progress into the second half of this year dedicated to Mary, whom our Holy Father has asked us to honor by special devotions, I am reminded of a paradox found in "The Little Book of Christ."
In Book IV, Thomas A. Kempis writes, "Many run to shrines to visit the relics of the Saints, and wonder to hear of their remarkable deeds; they behold the spacious buildings of their churches and kiss their sacred bones, enveloped in silk and gold."
"And behold Thou art here present to me on the altar, my God, the Saint of Saints, the Creator of men, and the Lord of Angels."
My present interest in this paradox concerns a parallel I see with the Marian Year, when all who can possibly do so travel great distances, often at considerable sacrifice, to honor Our Blessed Lady in one of her world renowned shrines; and yet we ignore, and tacitly insult by our unconcern, places of devotion dedicated to the Blessed Virgin often within walking distances of our own homes.

WHILE ADMIRING those who go half way across the world to visit a Marian shrine, and perhaps secretly wishing that we could emulate them, we stay-at-homes should not be satisfied with being remembered by our friends in their prayers at the holy places; we should seek out nearby shrines to which we make pilgrimages in honor of Mary. Just a few minutes' mental travel of our own New York State suggests several to me: Our Lady, Queen of Martyrs, at Attitash; Our Lady of Victory in Lackawanna, all the churches dedicated to Our Blessed Mother under her various titles in our own communities; and finally, the shrines dedicated to her, such as Our Lady of Lourdes here in Auburn.

SEVERAL communities in the State the rosary is recited nightly over the radio. Here we have a particular way in which to honor the Blessed Virgin who in her apparitions has repeatedly requested a greater rosary devotion. The sad commentary on our response to the Blessed Mother's request is the manner in which the rosary recitation broadcasts are attended. In some instances the number of lay people present to give the responses is embarrassingly small.

Granted that everyone can not attend these devotions every evening, there are several simple ways in which attendance might be increased. First, a family group might select one evening a week and plan to attend second, each Catholic organization in the community might ask two of its members to be present at each broadcast. Since the roster of most of our parish societies is long, the responsibility need not be onerous for individual members. (We should blush at that last statement, yet such is the way the modern world keeps whirling us away from the things of God.)

THE POINT is that each one of us should seek out ways which we, as individuals, as members of the parish, and as members of the community, can give more honor to Our Blessed Lady. My suggestion is to attend, as often as possible, the radio broadcasts from our communities and to join our voices to those of others so that the very night air will pulsate with our love and homage of the Mother of God under her title, Queen of the Most Holy Rosary.

'EVERYMAN' SET FOR TV

War's Hardships Led Actress, Mother of 2, Back To Stage
New York — (NC) — Waiting for the elevator in the lobby of the NBC rehearsal studios on lower Second Avenue, she scanned the listing of shows: Studio One, Television Theater, The Catholic Hour.

The doors opened on a bath of a room and they were waiting: producers, directors, floor men, production staff. "It's so different from Holland," she said, "all these people, I hope everything goes well."

It did. The rehearsal was a smooth one, Helene Costhock's solo presentation of the ancient morality play, "Everyman," in which she takes all the parts, was set. Her 70-minute Dutch version had been effectively cut to a half-hour program. The costume fittings and recording sessions had been successful. All that remained was the final polishing, correcting an accent here, adjusting a voice inflection there. Playing fifteen different roles in your own language is difficult, in a new and foreign tongue, it's a masterpiece.

But difficult tasks are not new to Mrs. Costhock. Her hardships started over thirteen years ago when her father had to escape to America from occupied Holland because of his pro-American sympathies. They continued when her husband of two and a half years, an actor known for his activities as a leader in the underground movement, was executed by the Nazis.

THE YEARS that followed were not pleasant for the young Mrs. Costhock and her two children. They are nine and ten now, devoted to their mother, unaware of the burden she had and the trials she endured in supporting them in the lean, waning years of the war.

Turning again to the theater, Mrs. Costhock developed the rare art form of enacting all the parts in various plays. For this purpose, she designed a series of dramatic and unusual masks which were executed by sculptor, Hans Melis, and painter, Jan Valenty.
