Cathedral Bells, 85 Years Old, Ring Out Praises Of Virtue

The Rev. Edward McNiff, assistant pastor at Sacred Heart Cathedral, has climbed the towers high over Flower City Park to discover and translate the inscriptions on the Cathedral bells.

The two huge bells have rung out their messages for the past

eighty-five years--first from the tower of old St. Patrick's and more recently from their present location over Flower City Park.

The Cathedral Bulletin, distributed to parishioners each Sunday, carries the translation of the Latin texts. The larger bell is dedicated to St. Patrick and was consecrated by Bishop McQuaid in the year after his installation as first Bishop of Rochester. The inscription on the bell reads: "I

will ring out the praise of virtue. In the year of salvation, 1869, the year of Pope Pius IX's Golden Jubilee as a priest, in this Cathedral just erected for Divine Worship, Edward McQuaid, the first Bishop of Rochester, consecrated me to St. Patrick, the Patron of this Church. Thanks to our donors. Rest to the dead."

The small bell is dedicated to St. Louis, patron saint of the one who donated the bell. The Latin text says: "I sing the praises of St. Louis. In the year of grace 1869, as the Most Illustrious Pontiff, Pope Pius IX summons a General Council, Louis Stanislaus Henryouis has donated me for the greatest glory of God. May God keep him and his household safe."

Scholarship Established

Rev. Mother Margaret Odome, principal of the Academy of the Sacred Heart, Rochester, has announced the establishment of a two-year scholarship for students entering the seventh or eighth grade at the Academy.

Rev. Mother stated in announcing the scholarship, that it was being offered in honor of the Marian Year and in recognition of the centenary of the Sisters of the Society of the Sacred Heart in this community.

Established first on St. Paul St., Rochester in 1855, the Sisters now reside at the Prince St. residence.

The scholarship will be given on the basis of results in a competitive examination set for Monday, Aug. 16 at 8 a.m. in the Academy. Application to try the examination must be made to Rev. Mother at the Prince St. address not later than Aug. 12.

Lay Professors Join John Fisher Faculty

The Rev. John P. O'Meara, C.S.B., Ph.D., Dean of St. John Fisher College has announced the appointment of two new members to the college faculty.

Ross H. Arnett, Jr., Ph. D., of Falls Church, Virginia has been named associate professor in the Department of Biology.

Dale G. Fallan, Ph.D., of Cresson, Pennsylvania, has been named assistant professor in the Department of Political Science.

DR. ARNETT is a graduate of Cornell University. He received his B.S. in entomology in 1942; M.S. in medical entomology in 1946; Ph. D. in insect taxonomy in 1948. In addition, he has taken specialized courses in entomology, vertebrate zoology, invertebrate zoology and botany.

While at Cornell University, he taught General Entomology, Medical Entomology, Parasitology and was responsible for all laboratory sections.

During the Second World War, he was instructor and section head at the Army School of Malariology at Fort Clayton, Panama Canal Zone. Also during the war, Arnett had charge of sanitation and insect control at Avon Park Bombing Range, Florida.

He has delivered 50 papers in the field of entomology and ecology, completed in manuscript form a book entitled "A Manual of Beetles." He is presently working on a book, "Systematic Biology, a philosophical approach." This book deals with the various philosophies current today among the majority of the biologists concerned with evolution, and shows how Aristotelian logic and teaching of the Scholastics gives a firm background to Systematic Biology.

Among the professional societies of which he is a member are: American Association for the Advancement of Science (Fellow), Ecological Society of America, Entomological Society of America, American Society of Zoologists, Botanical Society of America, Society of Systematic Zoology, Albertus Magnus Guild.

He has also been elected to the honor societies Sigma Xi and Phi Kappa Phi.

Arnett is presently employed by the United States Department of Agriculture as an entomologist and curator of insects at the United States National Museum, a part of the Smithsonian Institution.

He is married and the father of five children.

DR. FALLAN received his B.A. degree in History and Government in 1941 from Michigan State College; his M.A. degree in 1946 in American History from the University of Buffalo; his Ph.D. degree in Political Science in 1952 from the University

of Notre Dame. He has also done graduate work in Public Administration at the University of Michigan. He held the Bishop O'Hara Scholarship at Notre Dame University from 1949 to 1951.

His teaching experience includes work at Notre Dame University, Sampson College and St. Francis College, Cresson, Pennsylvania.

Fallan is a member of the following societies: American Political Science Association, American History Association, Midwest Political Science Association.

He is also a member of the National Rifle Association and the Alumni Associations of Michigan State, University of Buffalo and Notre Dame.

He is married and the father of two daughters.
