AST year 70% of all the financial help the Holy Father distributed to the missionary world came from the United States. Actually the amount was not great for it amounted to only 23c per Catholic man, woman and child. In other words we gave to the Holy Father for his 100,000 missionaries, 50,000 schools, 220 leprasaria, 3,500 dispensaries, 220 homes for the aged, 1,500 orphanages, 1,800 hospitals, the equivalent of one package of cigarettes.

This average of 23c is not due to a want of generosity on the part of the American Catholic. It is due rather to a want of consciousness of the duty of the Catholic to spread his faith through the world. It is like meeting a poor person. No help is given not because one is greedy or tight or avaricious, but because one's faith is not deep enough to see Christ in that poor person. Those who do not give in Christ's name see only the poor person and ask "Is he deserving?" So it is with the pagan world, the hungry, the lepers, the sick. There is not a single Catholic in the U.S. who would not sacrifice at least a dollar for them and thus share in the 15,000 Masses said annually for those who aid the Holy Fathers Missions.

The problem is to get every Catholic to see that every hungry person in India, every suffering soul in Nigeria, every persecuted missionary in China is Christ, hungry, suffering, and crueifled, Our Lord said: "I was hungry and you gave Me to est." The claims of the pagan world are not a test of your generosity. They are a test of your faith. What is your reaction?
