**Reds Release Aged Bishop In Romania**

Vienna (RNS) — Eighty-four-year-old Catholic Bishop Augustin Pacha of Timisoara, sentenced in 1951 to 18 years imprisonment for alleged spying against the Romanian Communist regime, has been released from jail because of ill health, the Romanian Legation announced here.

**BISHOP PACHA** and five priests were among ten persons tried before a military court in Bucharest on charges of treason against the state. The priests received sentences ranging from 12 years at hard labor to life imprisonment.

Following the trial, the Vatican issued a formal decree of excommunication against all persons involved in the arrest and imprisonment of Bishop Pacha and the priests.

According to the 1951 indictment, the group engaged in Vatican-directed espionage operations in conjunction with American, British, Italian and Swiss officials.

The indictment charged that the espionage was carried on continuously since 1936, first for the Germans, and then for the United States and Great Britain after 1944, under instructions from Archbishop Gerald P. O'Hara, Bishop of Savannah, Atlanta, Ga., who was formerly regent of the Papal Nunciature in Bucharest.

**ARCHBISHOP O'HARA**, now Apostolic Delegate to Great Britain, said at the time of the trial that "only a tissue of lies" could have involved him in the case. With the release of Bishop Pacha, four Latin Rite and four Byzantine Rite prelates of the Catholic hierarchy in Romania still are in prison or are otherwise impeded in their offices. Two others have died while serving sentences.

According to Catholic sources, no Romanian bishops have been permitted to administer to their faithful in the past three years. Communist rule is left of the regular diocesan curia, it was said.

**U. S. Airmen Attend English Pilgrimage**

London — (RNS) — A detachment of American Catholic Air Force men were among 15,000 persons from all over England who attended the annual pilgrimage to the ruins of ancient Glastonbury Abbey in Somerset. The Americans carried the Stars and Stripes as they walked in procession with the other pilgrims to Glastonbury Tor, site of the martyrdom of Abbot Whiting and his Benedictine community some 400 years ago.

On the lower slopes of the tor stood 14 crosses, built to the scale and weight of the Cross of Calvary. Below them, an open-air altar was erected at which a field Mass was celebrated by Bishop Joseph E. Rudderham of Clifton.

In a sermon during the Mass, Bishop John H. King of Portsmouth pointed out that the original abbey was dedicated to Our Lady of Glastonbury.

**St. John Knights Regiment To Observe 75th Anniversary**

Diamond Jubilee of Rochester Regiment, Knights of St. John will be marked next month with a two day program. On Saturday, Sept. 13, the regiment will gather in St. Joseph's Church, Franklin Street, Rochester to remember their departure at a Memorial Mass scheduled at 9 a.m.

On Sunday, Sept. 12 the anniversary will be marked with a Pontifical Jubilee Mass, with His Excellency Bishop Kearney, former Supreme Spiritual Advisor, pontificating. This Mass is also at 9 a.m. and will be preceded by a parade of the entire regiment in uniform.

**IN THE EVENING**, the seventy-fifth birthday celebration will conclude with a Diamond Jubilee Banquet in the Powers Hotel Ballroom.

Much was accomplished in the seventy-five years, since various Catholic semi-military societies affiliated with several parishes in the city, banded themselves together in the Roman Catholic Union which was to become the Rochester Regiment of the Knights of St. John. Highlights of the past will be featured in a history being prepared for publication in the September issue of the Rochester Reporter, official organ of the Regiment.

**Reunion Day Set Saturday At Girls' Camp At Lake**

Reunion Day at Camp MADONNA, the Catholic Women's Club camp for girls on Canandaigua Lake, will be held Saturday, August 14. Campers of each camping period during the summer will return with their parents and friends for this annual event.

The program this year will be held at 2:30 p.m. with a water sking contest followed by a presentation of "Hansel and Gretel" out of doors by the current group of campers. After a picnic supper brought by the parents, a father-and-daughter baseball game will take place.

Camp Madonna occupies 7 1/2 acres with 700 feet of waterfront on the west side of Canandaigua Lake. For two-week periods during the summer, three groups of 50 girls each between the ages of 8 and 14 are housed in a large, comfortable home. The Rev. John J. Leary, Chaplain, goes each Sunday to say Mass at an improvised altar on the lawn—not only for these campers, but for campers who come over from nearby Camp Onanca, and for neighborhood cottagers.

**CARE Drive To Aid Vietnam Refugees**

A pastoral letter by His Eminence Cardinal Spellman asking that prayers be offered for Vietnamese refugees at all Masses within the New York archdiocese to the campaign being conducted by CARE for immediate aid to these war victims.

Cardinal Spellman's pastoral letter, based on information received from Bishops in Vietnam, stressed the enormous problems caused by the mass flight of civilians from North to South Vietnam to escape from the communist-ruled Vietnam.

Cabled reports received by CARE from its Far East regional director state that the number of people who fled before the communist aggressors to the vicinity of Saigon has already passed the 500,000 mark and is expected to double within the next several weeks. Approximately one-third of these homeless and destitute refugees are children under 14.


CARE is the only outside private welfare agency operating in Vietnam. Immediately upon the conclusion of the cease-fire agreement of July 22, CARE made an emergency appropriation of \$60,000 for direct help to these refugees. But more aid is needed urgently.

**Tokyo University Lists Catholics**

Tokyo — (NC) — The student body at the Jesuit-conducted Sophia University here numbers 2,128, of whom 746 are Catholics, according to latest statistics. The teaching staff of 87 has 33 Catholics, excluding Jesuit professors. Sixty-six Catholics were graduated this year, as compared with two Catholics at the first commencement exercises of the university in 1918.
