

### Old Vatican Manuscripts Surprise 'Know-It-Alls'

Louisville, Ky. (NC)—Moderns with a know-it-all smugness might be jolted by some of the centuries old manuscripts from the Vatican Library which the Knights of Columbus are microfilming for preservation at St. Louis University.

Reporting to a K. of C. Supreme Council meeting here, Father Joseph Donnelly, S.J., secretary of the Knights of Columbus Foundation for the Preservation of Historic Documents at the Vatican Library, said: "We have the idea that Americans know everything... but I was running through an 11th century medical book by an Arab doctor and came across his advice to use mold bread to heal wounds.

WHO if his left hand were cut off and bleeding would not use his right hand to bind it? The Catholics of northern Vietnam who fell to the Communists in the treaty of "Peace" at Geneva are a part of our body which is the Church. There will now be a blackout over the Church in northern Vietnam as there is in Korea, China and Manchuria. Archbishop Philip Bernardini, General Secretary of the Holy Father's Missions in Rome, has better described the clergy and the faithful in these countries as belonging to "The Church of Silence."

They are silent! But shall we be silent too? Suppose the Communists overran the United States to Denver, burned your schools and hospitals, tortured thousands of your priests and nuns and promised you their kind of "liberty" only on condition that you give up the faith. Would you not expect your brethren East of Denver to do something for you, to provide food and clothing, to quickly erect extra schools for your children to keep your suffering? Well that is what the Church expects us to do now for the "Church of Silence."

### Cornerstone Rites Held For Waverly Parish School

Waverly—Simple rites marked the laying of the cornerstone for the new St. James School here Sunday morning following the eight o'clock Mass.

In the presence of more than 300 parishioners, the Rev. G. Stuart Hogan, pastor, sealed the stone which contained a history of the church as it appeared in the parish brochure and in the Waverly Sun, pictures of Father Hogan, Rev. Guy Wertz, assistant pastor, and Rev. Joseph McCarthy, his immediate predecessor, a copy of the Waverly Centennial brochure, and other items of historical value.

PRESENT AT the ceremony was Sister Mathilda, the newly appointed principal of the school which is scheduled to open on September 8th. Sister Mathilda will be joined later by Sister Agnes Rosario and Sister Marie Mathew who are now on retreat. Until the convent is completed, the Sisters will make their home in St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmhurst.

The new \$1,000,000 school, constructed at the cost of \$125,000, is located on Clark Street.

Although the school will be opened for the first, second and combined third and fourth grades on Sept. 8th, Father Hogan said the public reception will be held sometime in October when the official opening will be attended by His Excellency Bishop Kearney.

Confirmation will be conferred on that occasion also, Father Hogan announced.

### Sacred Heart Academy Opens Kindergarten

On the hundredth anniversary of its establishment, Rochester's Academy of the Sacred Heart is inaugurating a kindergarten this year for children aged 4 and 5 years. The kindergarten will open on Wednesday, Sept. 22 for both boys and girls. Classes will be held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Miss Callista Esterguard, a graduate of Nazareth College, and Miss Diane De Florio, an alumna of the College of the Sacred Heart, Lake Forest, Illinois will teach in the kindergarten department.

In the grammar and high school departments, an enrollment of 150 students is expected, according to Rev. Mother Margaret Odorne, principal. The school opens Thursday, Sept. 16.

Changes in the religious staff at Sacred Heart include: Mother Cunningham, who is replacing Mother Berberick, assigned to Greenwich, Conn.; and Mother Margaret Mary Hone, daughter of Mrs. Alexander B. Hone, Rochester, who is replacing Mother Starrs.

### Auburn, Elmira Slate High School Extensions

Two new extension schools will open this Fall in the dioceses of Rochester for a one year period to take care of the 9th grade student overflow at Elmira Catholic High School in Elmira, and Holy Family High School, Auburn.

The Elmira Catholic High Extension classes will be held in St. Mary's School. A new annex has been constructed at St. Francis of Assisi School, Auburn, as an extension to Holy Family High School. The forty students enrolled will be taught by the Religious of Jesus and Mary.

Both extension schools are temporary measures and will be concluded when the new Mt. Carmel High School, Auburn, and Notre Dame de Lourdes High School, Elmira, are completed. The two new high schools are now well along in construction and will be ready for occupancy sometime during the coming year, according to those in charge.

### 910 Students Enrolled At Mercy High

Students of Our Lady of Mercy High School, Blossom Rd., Rochester, will begin a new school year on Wednesday, Sept. 8, with an enrollment of 910 girls.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney will offer the Mass of the Holy Ghost for the student body in the auditorium on Monday, Sept. 13 at 9 a.m.

Appointments to the Mercy staff this year include: Sister Mary George, Sister Mary De-clan, Sister Mary De Chantal, Sister Mary Chrysostom and Sister Mary Howard, the school nurse.

A new course has been added to the curriculum this year in Advanced Algebra, and also the course in Latin IV has been resumed.

### Cadet Program In Third Year At Nazareth Hall

This year marks the third in the cadet program at Rochester's Nazareth Hall Cadet School and the seventeenth anniversary of the school itself, conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph.

Approximately 135 boys will be under the cadet supervision of Captain William F. Dyroff of the U. S. Marine Corps. Captain Dyroff is a member of the Department of Naval Science, University of Rochester.

Since the beginning of the cadet program, Captain Dyroff has taken an active part in the formal inspections held twice each year and in the St. Thomas Honor Society for seventh and eighth grade cadets.

The work in athletics will be directed by Mr. Robert Brickell of the Maplewood YMCA who has prepared a well-rounded program of swimming, boxing, tumbling, basketball and other sports.
