Bishop Ends Race Bars In Arkansas Catholic Schools

Little Rock, Ark. — (NC) — Bishop Albert L. Flecher of Little Rock declared it "especially urgent" that Catholic Negro children "be admitted to any Catholic school available in places where there is no Catholic school especially for them."

HE SAID IN an official announcement that "it should be constantly remembered by Catholics that the goal of the Church in the diocese will be that 'no Catholic student is refused admission to a Catholic school on account of race or color.'" Bishop Flecher's diocese consists of the whole State of Arkansas.

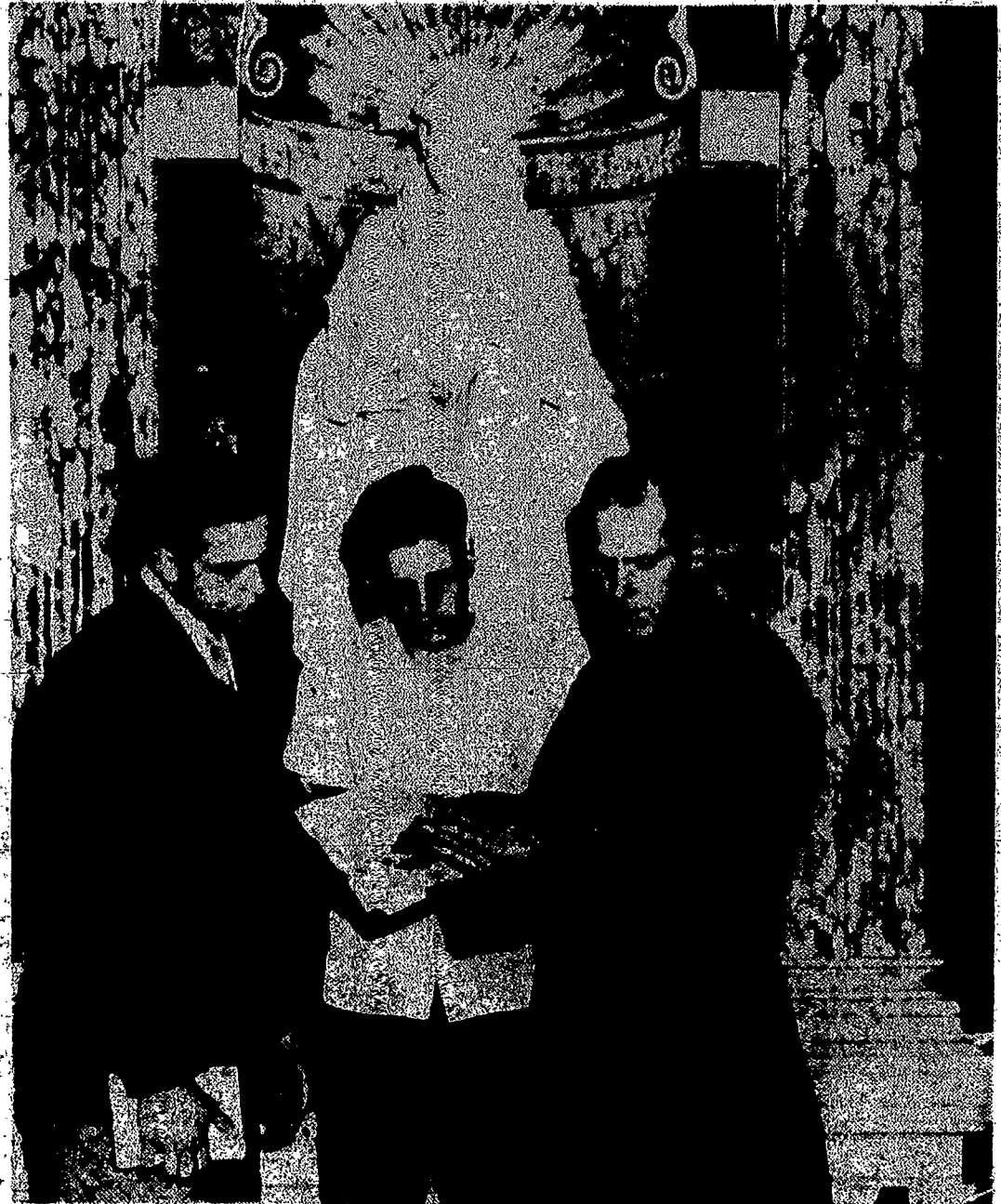
In his letter to the clergy, Religious and laity of his See, the Bishop recalled that since Catholic schools are private institutions, they are not subject to the Supreme Court decision of last May which declared race segregation in the public schools unconstitutional.

"THIS BEING THE case," he said, "some people have thought that Catholic schools will choose to continue the practice of racial segregation."

"This is a mistaken idea. It is contrary to the traditional practice of the Church . . . In places where segregation is enforced by law or custom, the Church simply does the best she can by trying to provide separate churches and schools for the different races."

Philadelphia Retreat House Dedicated

Philadelphia — (NC) — Thousands of Men of Malvern, the Laymen's weekend retreat movement in Philadelphia, attended the dedication of an \$80,000 three-unit structure with a chapel and dormitory wings bringing the capacity of St. Joseph-in-the-Hills, Malvern, Chester County, Pa., to 300 retreatants each week.

Archbishop John F. O'Hara of Philadelphia presided and Bishop George L. Leach of Harrisburg gave the dedicatory address at the exercises which included laying the cornerstone.

The retreat movement was started in Philadelphia 41 years ago. The new buildings will enable 15,000 men to make retreats each year.

Nation Is Losing Battle Against Smut Publications, Senate Probe Counsel Says

Cincinnati — (NC) — The nation is fighting "a losing battle" against immoral publications, a leader in the battle admitted here last week.

James H. Bobo, Memphis attorney now serving as associate counsel to the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Juvenile Delinquency, cited the mushrooming traffic in pornography. He said this amounts up to possibly \$300-million a year and continues to grow. Mr. Bobo came here to address the National Association of County and Prosecuting Attorneys at its fourth annual conference.

POBNOGRAPHY, HE explained in an interview, is material that is too obscene to be sold over the counter. It includes books, magazines, cartoons, records, photographs and films. A small book costing only a few cents to print may bring \$2 to \$8, he said, and the market is chiefly among young kids.

Fifty feet of obscene film may be rented for a single night for fees ranging up to \$100, he added.

Many parents, Mr. Bobo said, have "no idea" what their children read; what company they keep or where they spend their time. He added: "When our committee went to Philadelphia for hearings, everybody told us that the sale of liquor to minors was a rare occurrence there. But we sent out an investigator who turned up 450 kids 18 or under within a few hours in 35 downtown bars."

"ONE OF THE most alarming features of juvenile delinquency today," he went on, "is that youngsters of 14 and 15 are committing more crimes of violence — robbery, rape, even murder — than ever before."

Mr. Bobo said the subcommittee had found that approximately 100-million comic books are published every month, and that about one-fourth of them are in the "horror-crime" class.

"The normal youngster isn't bothered by them," he said, "but the kid who is not well adjusted or who is mentally unbalanced can be tremendously influenced by them."

He cited a Chicago youth who set fire to a tenement, causing 11 deaths, and who had collected stacks of comic books dealing with fires.

Only 150 persons are responsible for the publication of comic books, Mr. Bobo said, and about 70 of them are directly connected with the publication of crime and horror comics.

The self-regulating board set up by comic book publishers a couple of years ago is "not functioning," Mr. Bobo said. He also said that "a number of psychologists who have written approvingly of comic books have been found to be on the payroll of the comic book industry."

The curbing of comic books and pornography and the solution to the problem of juvenile delinquency will not come from Congress or the courts or social agencies, Mr. Bobo is convinced. "It will have to be a grass roots movement," he said, "with parents taking a leading role."
