

### District Attorney Urges Guard Against Delinquency

Corning—Vigilance to avert development of juvenile delinquency was urged a few days ago by Steuben County District Atty. Domenick L. Gabrielli of Bath in a talk before members of Corning Kiwanis Club.

Gabrielli stressed the fact that existence of bad comic books, bad literature and a laxity of the responsibility are our own fault. He warned that we should not let down our guard although we are not presently cursed by any wave of juvenile delinquency in our area.

"STRESSING THE importance of constant vigilance against all crime," the district attorney said "we as citizens of our respective communities should take responsibility and action if there is the slightest sign of social decay."

"Some juvenile misdemeanor is part of every generation's adolescent growing pains," he explained, "but the crime and violence that we see in other centers of population cannot fit into the

Tom Sawyer kind of trespassing. Between 1948 and 1953," he explained, "juvenile delinquency increased by 29 per cent throughout the nation. This spread through all economic levels and is a danger sign not to be ignored," he emphasized.

"IT IS OUR responsibility to our youth to rid their minds of any so-called glory in crime, immorality or indecency. Youngsters reared in an atmosphere of corruption, materialism and utter confusion as to fundamental moral values, have little to sustain them," he emphasized.

Describing as "a large order" the responsibility to keep the minds of youth straight-thinking, the district attorney emphasized that the reward for the effort is great and that much can be gained.

### Corning Electrician, Father Of 2 Sisters, Builds Unique Shrine To Blessed Mother

Corning—The two weeks vacation visit of Sister Michael Ann this month to the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Victor Hanly of 124 W. Third St., brought special joy to the family as she watched her father complete the building of an outdoor shrine dedicated to the Blessed Mother during this Marian Year.

The "L" shape grotto, built in the flowered back yard of the Hanly home is already being visited regularly by scores of Corningites. The idea for the shrine was suggested by Hanly's two daughters, Sister Michael Ann and Sister Mary Hilary.

However, after work was started on it, Hanly's son, Pfc. Thomas Hanly was killed while in military service so the shrine was dedicated to his memory this month.

Now decorate a large section of the shrine. Hanly, an electrician by trade with no previous experience as a mason or designer, started the big job Sept. 5, 1953, and completed it July 24 this year with time off from Nov. 16, 1953, until April 21, 1954, because of cold weather. He started without plans and worked out his specifications and design as work progressed.

Over the past 10 months, Hanly worked 599 hours on the religious project, mixing 2,520 pounds of cement and 3,900 pounds of sand, to say nothing of hauling hundreds of field stones to the site. Total cost of the project, forgetting time and labor, was \$108.99.

THE GROTTO STANDS eight feet above the ground level, with each leg of the "L" extending 16 feet. The walls measure 14 inches

thick, with the front wall 30 feet long and 2 1/2 feet thick. Of special interest is that the grotto contains stonework from the Ave Maria Shrine at Cullman, Ala.; the Holy Rosary Grotto at St. Michael's Mission on Hemlock Lake, and also one from "The Ravine" at the American Martyrs Shrine at Auriesville. Mr. and Mrs. Hanly's two daughters, Sister Michael Ann and Sister Mary Hilary, are both graduates of St. Patrick's School, Corning Free Academy and hold nursing degrees from St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing in Elmira.
